Mr. and Mrs. Walter Esslinger, of Mills City, Calif., are visiting Mr. and Mrs. A. R. McDonald.

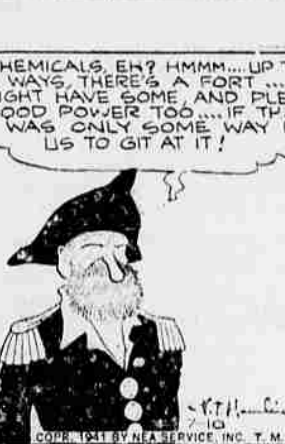

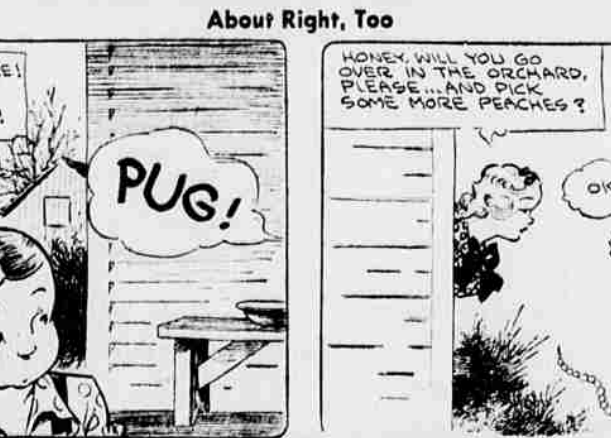

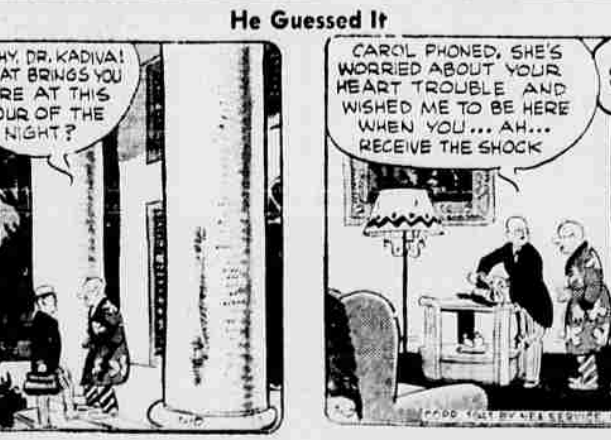
