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# Information For Recreationists

(Forest Service Bulletin)

North Umpqua: Streams are approaching their summer level, with steelhead fishing increasingly good in the lower waters. Trout fishing is good in the Steamboat area. Best catches are being made on Coachman flies. Roads are in fair shape. The Copeland creek sector will be open noons and evenings for the next week; also, all day Saturday and Sunday.

Diamond lake: Roads are dusty but in good shape. Fishing is fair with good catches being made by experienced fishermen in both Diamond lake and streams. Fire danger is increasing.

Bohemia: Fishing is fair. Roads are in fair shape. South Umpqua: Fishing at Fish lake was reported to be good. Streams are at summer level and stream fishing is good. Roads are rough but passable.

Warm weather for the past week has caused forest fuels to dry out rapidly, which means that fires starting now might become dangerously large in a very short time. Campers are therefore requested to be particularly careful with their cigarettes and follow the slogan, "Leave a clean camp and a dead fire."—Umpqua National Forest.
