Bus Contracts Let By School Board; Officers Elected

Luther Ellison of Roseburg was awarded the contract for transportation of pupils from the Willbur district to Roseburg at the meeting of the county educational board Thursday at the office of the county school superintendent. The meeting was held for the purpose of opening bids on transportation and considering transportation problems.

Because of insufficient data in bids on the Gazley-Canyonville route, the contract was not let but will be given further consideration at the meeting to be held in August.

The board elected J. M. Francis, Oakland, as chairman for the coming year. John Bacon of Umpqua was named assistant chairman. Other members of the board are J. G. Barnes, Tenmile; Fred Bonebrake, Melrose, and J. D. Loffer, Tillamook. Mrs. Lulu C. Gorrill, county school superintendent, is secretary, and Attorney Paul Geddes is legal adviser.

In other actions taken by the board at the meeting yesterday, John H. Linaman of Olalla was given the contract for the stub bus line at Olalla. H. C. Wann was employed to audit the financial records of the non-high school district. The board will select a budget committee to convene with the board members at the August meeting, the committee to include one representative from each zone of the county.

Circuit Court Jury of Douglas Is Recalled Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly announced today that he is recalling the circuit court jury on July 24. Germany Frees American Survivors of Zamzam NEW YORK, July 11.—(AP)—William V. C. Ruxton, president of the British American ambulance corps, announced today that 21 American men who survived the sinking of the Egyptian steamer Zamzam were being released by German authorities for return to the United States.

Ruxton said the German government had informed the U. S. state department that the men, volunteer members of ambulance corps units, were being sent to Lisbon for removal to the United States aboard the army transport West Point.

The West Point is to sail from here Tuesday with German and Italian officials ordered to leave the country. Present plans call for the West Point to return to this country American nationals ordered out of the axis countries.

WOOL BOSTON, July 11.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "For the most part the wool market has marked time this past week, pending the announcement of government awards. Some options have been taken up in wool and tops against awards made on blankets, linings and overcoatings but this has

hardly disturbed the market. "The limited volume of business put through on civilian account has included at steady prices and has been a little of almost every type of wool. "Operations in the west have been negligible except in Texas, where a fair weight of 12 months wools was sold at prices equivalent to \$1.05, clean basis, delivered, Boston. "Foreign markets have had little to offer this week in the way of news, offerings being few and of lesser attractiveness. "Mohair is quiet with prices steadily maintained."
