

Medford Juniors Defeat Douglas Team; Score 10-3

Apparently suffering from over-confidence, the Douglas county Legion Juniors contributed seven errors as Medford won 10 to 3 in a league game played at Finlay field Thursday afternoon. The Roseburg team won both ends of a double-header at Medford Sunday and apparently were anticipating an easy victory yesterday and were lacking in "hustle."

Jandreau, Medford pitcher, had the local hitters swinging weakly at a "roundhouse" curve ball which he tossed up four out of five pitches. The Roseburg hitters were tapping the ball back to the box and Jandreau made nine assists during the course of the game.

an attack against "the dignity of the nation."

Warfare Still Raging
A heavy British attack on the French lines south of Beirut was said to have been launched yesterday at 3 p. m. and the latest dispatches said fighting still was raging.

The French said they were holding against the assault and reported shooting down four British planes and damaging another at a cost to themselves of only one.

A dispatch last night declaring Beirut an open city contained a sign of Vichy "bitterness." Throughout, the note referred to the British as "the enemy" — a characterization not used since the first days of the hostilities.

Until last night the French had used the term "adversary" or "adverse units" and the like. (Dispatches from Ankara, Turkey, said German air transports had landed Vichy reinforcements in Aleppo, Syria, in an attempt to prolong French resistance.)

RAF, ITALIAN PLANES STRIKE COUNTER BLOWS

In the war in the air, RAF bombers yesterday raked the city of Naples, Italy, for the second night in a row. The Italian high command reported "much damage to civilian dwellings," with five persons killed and 20 wounded in a three-hour raid.

Italian planes, on the other hand, bombed refineries at Haifa, in Palestine, causing large fires which were still blazing many hours after the raid was over, the communiqué said.

The British airport at Nicosia on the island of Cyprus also was said to have been bombed again, destroying British planes on the ground.

Tobruk, besieged British stronghold in Libya, was the target of new aerial attacks and defense installations were reported hit, while at Salum, Egypt, British mechanized vehicles were attacked.

The British carried out routine raids on Benghazi and Derna, the Italians said.

In the west, other RAF raiders smashed at Cologne. In the German Rhineland, and attacked Ostend, Calais and Boulogne on the Nazi-occupied channel coast.

To a question whether the supplemental appropriation estimates being submitted to congress would mean increased taxes, the president said he supposed the answer was that you have a tax bill about every year. Tax bills are based on a year's operations and not on supplementary estimates that come along later, he said.

Comments On Bases Abroad

President Roosevelt declared today he would not be surprised if American steel had gone into 50 British bases and if American workmen all over the world were being paid by the British government.

And this, he said, is perfectly legal.

The president made his statement at a conference where the construction of American bases in Ireland or Scotland arose. Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) has said he had information such construction was under way.

When a reporter remarked that there seemed to be some substantial contentions, the president said whatever was being done was being accomplished either through straight purchases by the British government or under the lease-lend act.

It was then he went on to say he would not be surprised if Americans were working for the British all over the world and American steel was being used in bases from Canada to South America and God knows where.

Mr. Roosevelt had no comment on the suggestion of Wendell L. Willkie that American bases be established in the British isles.

Wheeler asserted that cargoes of materials already had been sent to northern Ireland and Scotland for construction of United States naval bases.

AMERICANS AID PROJECT IN NORTHERN IRELAND

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, July 11.—(AP)—Technicians and workers from the United States are engaged on a construction project of an undisclosed nature in northern Ireland.

In London the foreign office said these Americans were "direct employees of the British government" and asserted that reports that the United States is establishing an air base in northern Ireland "are not borne out by information available in London."

People of northern Ireland, which is sharing in Britain's war against Germany, have given many evidences of the popularity of the Americans.

Bands are buying copies of "The Star Spangled Banner" to play in their honor. The Americans spend their money freely and some are said to have handed out pound notes for tips, mistaking them for dollar bills.

The United States contingent celebrated the Fourth of July by going to Dublin, the capital of neutral Eire.

Red warplanes were declared to have shot 68 German planes out of the sky, or destroyed them on the ground, compared with a loss of nine soviet aircraft.

Nazis Claim Big Capture
Silent on present operations, Hitler's field headquarters went back to the bloody struggle in the forests of Bialystok, reporting the conclusion of that conflict with the capture of 323,898 red army troops, 3,332 tanks, 1,809 guns and an enormous quantity of supplies.

The Germans implied that the mass of naz tanks and infantry engaged in the Bialystok mop-up now would be turned into a juggernaut smash against the Stalin line.

Hitler's high command described the action, in which two soviet armies were trapped, as "the greatest materiel and envelopment battle in the history of the world."

Predict Soviet Collapse
"The military collapse of Russia is a foregone conclusion," a German commentator declared and other German observers pictured growing confusion among Russian troops in the area east of the Bialystok-Minsk battlefields where panzer blows have driven deepest toward Moscow.

On the road to Moscow the Russians said they had smashed two

German divisions, destroying more than 80 tanks, killing more than 3,500 Germans and taking another 2,400 prisoner.

Guerrilla activity behind the German lines was meeting with success, the Russians said.

The Nazi high command said prisoners already taken approached a half-million and that the Russians had lost 6,233 warplanes, 7,615 tanks and 4,423 guns.

Rev. Rummell Of Dillard Passes

Rev. H. W. Rummell, 72, retired Methodist minister, died Thursday at his home at Dillard, following a long period of ill health.

He was born in Winfield, Iowa, January 25, 1869, and in early life moved with his parents to Nebraska, where he entered the ministry and became a member of the Nebraska conference.

He was married in 1905 to Bertha V. Memely, and came to Oregon with his family in 1910. He served his first charge on the Tenmile circuit. He served in several localities throughout the state, but the greater part of his work was in Douglas county.

He moved to Dillard in 1929 because of failing health, but continued to serve the churches of Tenmile, Camas Valley and Canyonville. His last full-time service was given to the church at Drain, where he spent three years.

Surviving are his widow and two sons, Paul and Philip Rummell, all residents at Dillard. He also leaves three brothers and two sisters: Braekken Rummell, Mrs. Kathryn Claycomb and Mrs. Emma M. Schnoor, all of Glendale, Calif.; Charles Rummell, Arcadia, Calif., and George Rummell, Beaumont, Calif.

Funeral services will be held at the Dillard church at 10:30 a. m. Monday. Interment will follow in Civil Bend cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Roseburg Undertaking company.

Strike Paralyzes Chrysler Plants

Forty thousand employees of Chrysler corporation and the Briggs Manufacturing company were idle today, a spokesman said, because of failure to obtain upholstery from the struck plant of National Automotive Fibres, Inc.

The Plymouth plant and part of the Briggs factory, which makes bodies for Chrysler, were the last units to be affected by the materials shortage. Chrysler, Dodge and DeSoto plants had been closed previously.

The CIO-United Automobile Workers walked out of National Automotive Fibres in a dispute involving increased wages upon expiration of a current contract, expiring Aug. 1. The present scale was not disclosed.

A strike of 60 AFL building and construction trades union members was called yesterday at a \$2,500,000 naval ammunition dump being built 50 miles north

of San Diego, Calif. A union spokesman declared the contractor had violated a verbal agreement regarding working conditions. He said wages and hours were not involved.
