Indian Tribes Theme of Missioner Billed Here

The population of Indian tribes in the United States is showing a marked increase, according to Miss Hope Elizabeth Haupt, of Washington, D. C., lecturer on Indian affairs. Miss Haupt is arranging a series of local lectures and will speak Sunday and Wednesday at the First Baptist church in Roseburg. She will return in the fall for other local speaking engagements, she reports.

Praising the work of John Collier, present Indian commissioner, she declared that his understanding of problems among the tribes has resulted in great betterment of conditions.

She will speak before the combined young people's groups of the local church at 6:30 p. m. Sunday, and address the midweek service at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday. Miss Haupt has served as a missionary to the Indians, and is considered an authority on Indian life. She is the author of a book dealing with her work among the Indians.

Nazi Shock Troops Lunge At Russian Defenses

claims, DNB said that despite rain, nasty terrain and heavy Russian tank and infantry opposition German troops yesterday pushed their foe back all along the southern sector of the battle front.

An authorized Berlin spokesman asserted that the Luftwaffe had destroyed 188 Russian planes in the past 24 hours and said 163 of these were shot down in air battles. He placed German air losses in that period at about one plane for every seven red army planes destroyed.

DNB reported that 1,100 Catholic priests had been found shot in Kaunas, capital of Lithuania, and that proof of the slaughter as OGPU (former name for the Russian secret police) action would be sent to the Vatican.

The Hungarian general staff said tonight that motorized Hungarian forces had broken Russian resistance on the Zbrucz and now are pursuing red army defenders east of the river, which once was the border between Galicia and the Russian Ukraine. Roosevelt Praises Russ

President Roosevelt said the American people, "bound with strong ties of historic friendship to the Russian people, are observing with sympathy and admiration the valiant struggle which the Russian people are waging at the present time in self-defense."

from axis operations in South America and the western Pacific. Word to that effect, it was declared, impelled the war department to ask congress for immediate liberalization of the selective service act.

These sources said that Secretary of War Stimson and General George C. Marshall had advised congressional friends that the Philippine islands was "the sore spot" at present and that Nazi infiltration in some South American countries was "at the danger point."

Marshall, the army chief of staff, recommended to Stimson last week that congress permit drafted men to be sent outside the western hemisphere and be kept in training for more than a year—thus voiding two restrictions placed in the basic law last year.

Stimson and Marshall were reported to have attempted yesterday to convince house leaders of the necessity of liberalizing the law, but with little if any success.
