

Legion Juniors Win First Game, Tie 1-1 in Second

The Roseburg Legion Juniors were victors in one game, 9 to 8, and tied the second, 1 to 1, both extra inning affairs, in playing Rollie Hamer's ex-Junior all-stars from Eugene at Finlay field Sunday. The first game, scheduled for seven innings, went into the eighth frame before Roseburg broke an 8-all tie, while the second game scheduled for five innings, went to seven and was called with the score tied because of the necessity of the Eugene players to return home.

An outstanding feature of yesterday's game was the discovery of a new pitching prospect in Don Bigelow, 15, Yoncalla high school sophomore. Bigelow pitched the final four innings of the second game, allowing four scratch hits and no runs.

The first game was a see-saw affair with the locals coming from behind three times to tie the score and finally win in the 8th when Cox singled, advanced to third on an error and scored on a fielder's choice.

Cox started the game but retired in the fifth in favor of Dick DeBernardi, who was being saved for Thursday's game with Marshfield. DeBernardi pulled out of a bad hole, only to get himself into a tight spot in the seventh when he hit three batters in a row and then retired the side with one run. Main pitched the last inning and received credit for the win. Roseburg collected 13 hits off Eugene pitcher, Pitchers' Duel Staged.

The second game was a brilliant pitchers' duel after the first inning, in which both teams scored one run. Main started and allowed three hits in as many innings, retiring the side on strikeouts in the third. Bigelow took over in the fourth and exhibited remarkable control and an excellent curve ball. Plath, pitching for Eugene, allowed only four hits and had three strikeouts. Both teams looked good in the field. Eugene made two double plays and Roseburg turned in one double killing.

Cox Howard Parks was reported well pleased with the "hustle" of the local players, who were meeting older and more experienced opponents.

Roseburg plays at Marshfield Thursday in a league game, and will meet the Coos Bay team on Finlay field Sunday in a double header.

Ration Warning Given Americans

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 14. (AP)—Leon Henderson asserted bluntly today that "the party is over" as far as the retail sales boom occasioned by defense spending is concerned.

The administrator of the office of price administration and civilian supply said that defense needs would require rationing of the materials which go into manufacturing articles the public has been buying in ever-increasing amounts.

It already has become apparent, he said, that practically no aluminum would be available for civilian use after military needs were met and "it is becoming evident now that the amount of copper, steel, nickel, zinc, chrome, manganese and a number of other materials required for armaments is going to be so great that we won't have enough left over for consumers durable goods."

This, he continued, "means rationing, not by cards at the stores but at the raw materials line, and rationing means that someone is going to get hurt."

Henderson said there was grave danger of inflation and that the office of price administration was going to "bargain ahead" in the fight against it.

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committee deferred for a week consideration of legislation which would authorize President Roosevelt to requisition private property for defense purposes.

Knox Opposes War, But—Secretary Knox, rounding out a year as civilian head of the navy, expressed hope today that the policy of aid to Britain would not lead this country into war, but he added that war would be "infinitely preferable" to a peace "accomplished by a surrender to Hitlerism."

As the cabinet's most outspoken champion of all-out assistance to the British, Knox said in an anniversary interview that "I have been realistic enough to pursue that policy wherever the pursuit of such a policy might lead."

"I hope it will not lead us into war," he continued. "But in my eyes a war of defense against nazism would be infinitely preferable to a peace accomplished by a surrender to Hitlerism and all that would mean to the freedom and independence of the American people."

The Chicago publisher, one of the two republican members of President Roosevelt's cabinet, chose his words carefully in response to a remark that some persons had come to regard him as leader of a "war party." "No sane man wants war," he said. "I happen to belong to a school of thinkers who regard as imperative a policy of aiding England at whatever cost to ourselves, to promote both our present security and future national welfare."

He added that he did not believe "a free, independent, democratic United States of America could long survive in a nazi-dominated world."

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Cantonment Plans Near Completion

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—(AP)—The army's plans for two more cantonments in Oregon are nearing completion, the constructing quartermaster's office of the ninth corps area said Saturday.

Each of the camps, one near Medford, the other in the Eugene-Corvallis area, would house 15,245 troops, plus other personnel.

Each would cost approximately \$22,800,000. With a third camp planned for southern California, expenditures would total \$68,400,000, far outstripping the cost of any new army construction yet in the ninth corps area comprising California, Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho, Nevada and Utah. The camps would dwarf in size any other in the area save Ft. Lewis, Wash.

Field surveys are 40 per cent completed at Medford, but no steps have been taken toward acquisition of acreage.

Architect-engineers headquarters at Eugene, have made studies for the Eugene-Corvallis camp. No site has been chosen.

Actual construction depends on congressional approval and availability of desirable sites.

Soviet Defense Lines Broken, Nazis Report

the radio asserted, German invasion columns moved forward on a broad front across the Dnepr river and the upper reaches of the Dvina river after breaking through the Stalin line.

The German Fuehrer's headquarters said Finnish troops had opened an attack in Karelia, on both sides of Lake Ladoga, in the sector closest to Leningrad.

"The main strength of the powerful soviet army is broken," asserted DNB, reporting also that nazi blitzkrieg legions had slashed through the main Stalin line defenses "at all decisive points."

Dispatches from Ankara, Turkey, reported that soviet government officials were preparing to move from Moscow, although the Germans are still some 300 miles from the red capital, and that the British mission had already transferred to Gorki, 250 miles east.

Russians Report Lull
By contract, the Russians, after reporting that the 2,000-mile front was aflame with a series of gigantic new battles over the weekend, declared in this morning's communique that no major fighting took place during the night and that there had been

no significant changes in the struggle in the last several hours.

In London, authoritative quarters said the nazi drive toward Leningrad was "the most dangerous," but that Berlin claims of huge gains were regarded as "extravagant."

A soviet communique, reporting an overnight lull in the fighting, said that "torturers of the medieval inquisitions pale before the outrages perpetrated by the Hitlerian bandits."

The communique asserted that every fifth resident of a soviet village, women and children included, was shot when they refused to inform the Germans on guerrilla activities.

The German-controlled Holland radio said the fall of Kiev, the Ukraine capital, was "to be expected at any moment."

Jubilantly, Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels proclaimed to the German public through press and radio that "there is no salvation for the soviet armies . . . the decision in the east has already been attained."

As for a separate peace with Russia, the Germans made it clear that there could be no question of compromise. "The reich, it was said, had a 'mandate' from all Europe to liquidate bolshevism."

Eldest of Fisher Body Firm Passes on at 63

DETROIT, July 14.—(AP)—Fred Fisher, 63, eldest of the seven famous Fisher brothers and co-founder of the Fisher Body corporation, which figured prominently in the growth of the automobile industry, died today of a heart ailment.

Fred, eldest of the Fisher brothers who gained international fame with the upsurge of the "horseless carriage," began his career in his father's blacksmith shop in Norwalk, O.

He and his brother Charles led the way to automotive empire after their father, Lawrence Fisher, had expanded his business into a carriage shop.

War in Syria Brought to Close With Armistice

two 6,000-ton ships and shot down seven German fighters in two morning raids on the nazi-held ports of Cherbourg and Le Havre, France, today, an authoritative announcement said.

The big bombers were escorted by fighting planes as they swept across the channel for the attacks on France after night raids which extended from the coast to industrial northwestern Germany.

Nazi daylight raiders also struck across the channel. Three soldiers were reported wounded when a German plane machine-gunned a train in southern England early this morning.

In the night raids, Docks at Amsterdam and Ostend were reported raided and targets as distant as Bremen and Vegesack hit.

BRITISH AGAIN FAIL TO BREAK SIEGE OF TOBRUK

ROME, July 14.—(AP)—Two British attempts to break the three-month siege of Tobruk have been shattered by the axis besiegers, official Italian reports said today, and the position of the besieged grows "more painful, unbearable and precarious every day."

Stefani, the official news agency, outdid the high com-

mand in its account of thrusts by the British imperial force to break out of the Libyan coastal town, ringed by the sea, the desert and axis lines—an island of British conquest remaining from the Libyan retreat.

The British "paid very dearly" for the thrusts, the agency said. Systematic bombardment by Italian and German planes and incessant artillery fire have destroyed supply dumps and the equipment with which the British distill sea water to stave off the desert thirst, it went on. Axis forces also keep a close watch over supply ships trying to reach the harbor.

THREE ITALIAN VESSELS SUNK BY BRITISH SUBS

LONDON, July 14.—(AP)—The admiralty reported tonight the sinking of at least three Italian vessels, including one carrying troops and supplies, in the Mediterranean.

All were credited to submarines of Britain's Mediterranean fleet. The ministry of home security announced today that only 399 persons were killed in air raids on Britain in June, the lowest of any month since July, 1940.

Seven men are missing and believed killed, the ministry added, and 461 persons injured in raids are detained in hospitals.

Among the 399 known deaths in June were 175 men, 100 women and 64 children.

The June total brought raid

casualties for the past 13 months in which official figures are available to 94,986, including 41,488 killed and 53,498 hospitalized.

In this connection it was recalled that only recently Britain announced her total military casualties had passed the 100,000 mark.

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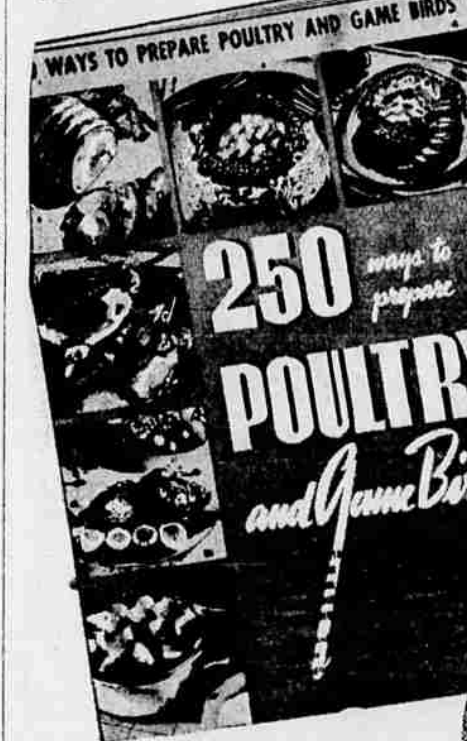
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
