Dairy Products in Oregon Increase

A new peak in butter and cheese production was reached in Oregon in 1940, according to the Oregon dairy products report just issued by the state department of agriculture in cooperation with the agriculture marketing service of the USDA. Creamery butter output reached 32,130,270 pounds, an increase of 1,003,270 pounds over 1939. American or cheddar cheese manufactured in Oregon last year totaled more than 21 million pounds, or more than one million pounds over the previous year.

Production of other varieties of cheese totaled 341,254 pounds, not including 1,712,795 pounds of cottage, pot or bakers' cheese. The output of condensed products made great strides, with 39,159,521 pounds of the various classes of condensed and evaporated milks manufactured against 33,525,000 pounds in 1939.

Dried or powdered milk products also made substantial gains, soaring to 19,260,320 pounds. The previous year the output of such products was 14,710 pounds.

Ice cream production last year included 2,022,000 gallons made at plants and 1,113,000 (estimated) gallons made by counter freezers. This represented a combined increase of 30,000 gallons over 1939. Sherbet production, on the other hand, was greater the previous year, with 60,000 gallons made in 1940 and 74,000 gallons in 1939.

U. S. Bidding For Argentine Metals

WASHINGTON, July 16—(AP)—The United States has opened discussions with Argentina for large purchases of strategic minerals and metals as the latest step in a program expected to result in purchases of \$500,000,000 worth of defense raw materials annually from the other American republics.

Discussions with Argentina quickly followed conclusion of an agreement with Mexico for acquisition by this country of lead, mercury, antimony, tungsten and other vitally needed raw materials in quantities estimated at \$100,000,000 yearly.

Similar pacts calling for large purchases of strategic and essential minerals and metals already have been negotiated with several other American nations, notably Chile (copper and nitrates), Bolivia (tin), and Brazil.

Since German and Japanese buyers in other South and Central American countries have attempted to buy all available stocks whenever they have been able to secure specific information, no details of prospective Argentine purchases have been made public.

However, statistics published by the department of commerce show that Argentina has exported to the United States varying amounts of tin, manganese, antimony, tungsten, platinum and beryllium—all important in national defense production—as well as large quantities of wool and hides and important tanning and dyeing materials.

Prisoner Burns Self to Death in Padded Cell

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., July 16.—(AP)—A fire in the padded cell of the San Mateo county jail took the life of a prisoner yesterday.

The victim of the blaze was L. C. Crews, 36, of San Bruno, serving ten days for reckless driving. Sheriff James J. McGrath said Crews, lodged in the jail yesterday, was transferred to solitary confinement—the padded cell quarter—after another prisoner complained he was acting queerly.

The pads around the concrete cell were lined with excelsior. The sheriff said Crews was searched for matches, but that some must have been concealed. The stuffing had been pulled from the pads and ignited.
