The chairman of their district will call and if there is no aluminum on the porch, will inquire at the door, if any will be obtainable for the drive.

Chairmen announced by Mrs. Bell for the drive, which will open July 21 and continue through July 29, include: Section south of Cass and west of Jackson street to railroad tracks to be collected by the Junior Woman's club with Mrs. C. E. Smith as chairman.

Laurelwood and West Roseburg to be collected by the auxiliary to the Fraternal Order of Eagles with Mrs. Bender as chairman.
