

Yankees Increase League Lead By Blasting Indians

The latest report on the major league races is that they probably are going to follow the same pattern that everybody was accustomed to before last year.

The New York Yankees are right on the verge of running away from the rest of the American league while the National league is in the throes of another one of those push-and-pull struggles that very likely may last right down to the finish in September.

The Yankees blasted out a 10-3 victory over the Cleveland Indians yesterday in the first tussle of their three-game clash and cleared up most of the doubt about their being the best club in the league.

With Joe DiMaggio hitting a double and two singles to stretch his hitting streak to 56 consecutive games, and Keller smashing out a triple and his 20th home run of the year, the Yankees rode rough shod to their eighth triumph in 11 games against the Indians this season and increased their first place margin to six full games.

Cards Drub Dodgers.

On the other hand the Brooklyn Dodgers, who had a chance to bottle up the senior circuit just as completely, were raided 7-4 by the St. Louis Cardinals and had their lead cut to three games last night.

The New York Giants stayed off the Cincinnati Reds' threat at third place in the senior loop by whipping Walters 7-4.

Pittsburg and Boston divided a doubleheader, Tobin pitching the Braves to a 4-1 triumph in the first game and then the Pirates rallying with seven runs in the seventh inning of the nightcap to win 13-5.

The Chicago Cubs captured a 9-5 decision over the hapless Phillies in their night game, Root gathering in the 198th triumph of his career although needing help. He also contributed a home run to his own cause.

In the other American league games the Boston Red Sox edged out the Chicago White Sox, 2-1 and the St. Louis Browns overpowered the Philadelphia Athletics, 11-2.

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President W. C. Tuttle of the Pacific Coast league set the penalty after conferring with William G. Bramham, president of the National Association of Professional Baseball leagues. It was reported to be the severest penalty ever meted for such an offense.

Mayo sparked the Angels to the Coast league championship in 1938 and was voted the circuit's most valuable player. He was with the New York Giants in 1936 and with the Boston Braves in 1937 and 1938. He was scouted often last season and, with a .300 batting average and 13 homers this season, was bidding for a return to the majors.

Mayo's loss was the second severe blow to the Angels this month. Judge Bramham declared the team's leading pitcher, Julio Bonetti, ineligible for organized baseball for associating with gamblers. Bramham said, however, there was no evidence that Bonetti ever had thrown a game.

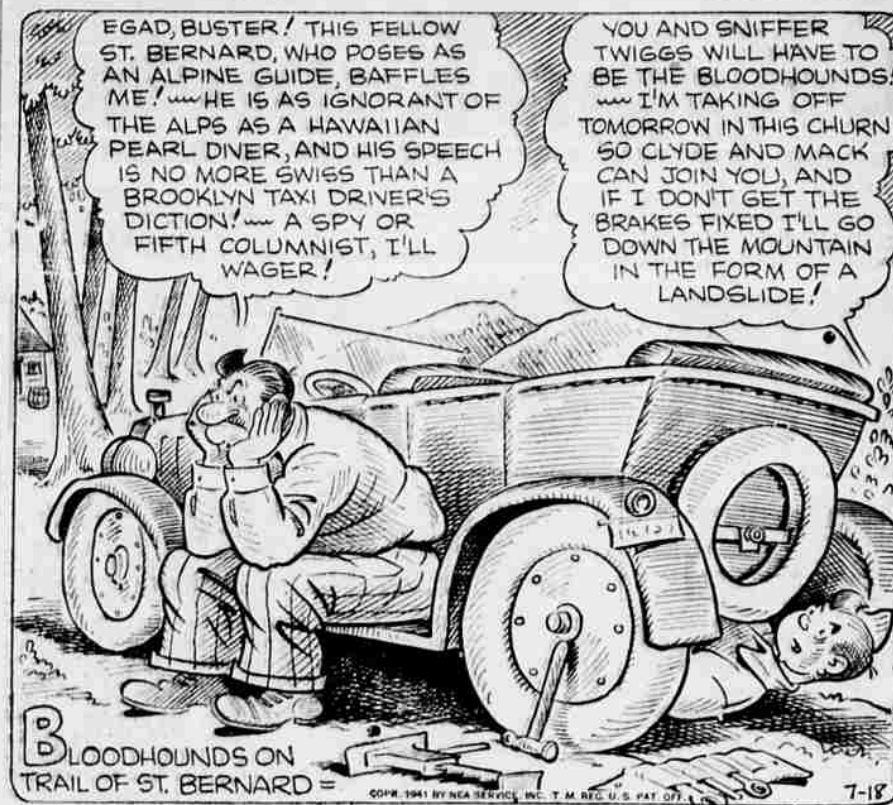

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Top War Phase to Come, Briton Says

LONDON, July 16.—(AP)—A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, told a gathering which included several United States marines today that "the grim, most part of the war is yet to come."

"It is on the battle of the Atlantic that our life depends," Alexander said, "and if we defeat the U-boat and the long range aircraft our strength will steadily become overwhelming."

"As to the defeat of the U-boat, I am not going to give you facts and figures for which the intelligence service of the enemy would certainly be prepared to pay many thousands of pounds. I will tell you, however, that during a recent period I received a series of reports which would encourage any first lord."

In addition to the U-boats reported definitely destroyed, Alexander said, he was "certain there are many more which do not get back to Germany and Italy."

The recent figures on enemy shipping losses, he added, are "highly satisfactory."
