

Stone-Hurling Mob Is Dispersed by Tear Gas

tear gas burns. Automobiles Battered

Employees who wished to work had started for the plant in a motor caravan and were met at the only approach road by a crowd variously estimated from 600 to 2,000.

The stone-throwing began when two automobiles attempted to enter the gates. Both were halted, the windows smashed and bodies dented. One of them succeeded in entering the plant.

A few minutes later the bus and several more cars were stopped before they crossed the railroad tracks that parallel the plant.

The passengers, including several women, ducked frantically as rocks hurtled through the air, shattering every window. Police backed the bus away. The battered cars were abandoned.

The company spokesman said the attacking throng was composed mostly of CIO workers from the Brewster Aeronautical corporation plant, Newark, and the Federal Shipbuilding and Dry Dock company, Kearny.

STRIKE HITS SHIPYARDS AT ROGUE RIVER, MICH.

At River Rouge, Mich., members of the CIO-steel workers organizing committee ignored a 30-day cooling off period imposed by the state labor mediation board and went on strike today at the Great Lakes Engineering Works, engaged in building lake ships for iron ore transport.

The strike involves an inter-union dispute and the office of production management had asked the SWOC not to "defy the government" with a walkout. Charles Cowl, SWOC field representative, replied that "we are not defying the government but are defying a firm that is defying the government by refusing to deal with the union of the employees' choosing."

A week-old strike at the American Car and Foundry company, Chicago, involving about 1,000 members of the CIO-UAW, was referred to Washington, meanwhile, after negotiators meeting with a federal conciliator failed to reach an agreement. Facts in the case were laid before the federal conciliation service in the national capital.

The union, which signed a contract with the company in March, demanded changes in production procedure which would enable workers in various classifications to earn from \$7.92 to \$9.18 a day.

of the town.

The Russians claimed they dealt a smashing blow to the Germans farther south along the Dnepr, driving them back from their bridgeheads to the Bibruska area and cutting off and destroying an entire tank battalion in the retreat.

These battles came to a halt at nightfall, however, and the soviet command declared that no important changes in the positions of troops and no major operations took place during the night except around Pskov and Pskhov.

Red Army Battered

The Germans asserted that protracted rearward resistance by red army troops in the Smolensk sector had been crushed, and that the Nazi advance eastward was continuing swiftly.

On the southern end of the 2,000-mile battlefront, the Germans also reported the capture of Kishinev, capital of Bessarabia.

The Germans declared more than 1,000 red army prisoners were taken in the Smolensk sector, including a soviet division's chief of staff.

On the English channel front, RAF warplanes were reported to have struck a heavy blow at axis shipping with 17 vessels totalling 90,000 to 100,000 tons "put out of action" and five others of 40,000 to 45,000 tons badly damaged in the port of German-held Rotterdam, The Netherlands.

Prison Term Meted to Post Office Burglar

He pleaded guilty to taking \$127 in postal funds.

Margarete Ruthau, jointly indicted with him, was convicted by a jury but Judge Fee delayed sentence pending a probation officer's report.

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Civilian Defense Post Given Ex-Mayor Carson

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—F. H. LaGuardia, director of civilian defense, today appointed Joseph Carson, Jr., former mayor of Portland, Ore.; Bernard M. Dickmann, former mayor of St. Louis, and Mayor Joseph Scholz of Louisville, as inspectors general for the office of civilian defense.

Carson and Dickmann will devote full time to their new positions, officials said, and Schulz will devote as much time as possible to civilian defense during the remainder of his term as mayor.

The first task of the new officials will be to establish regional civilian defense offices.

Carson is in San Francisco to establish an office there and Dickmann is to open one in Omaha, Neb.

burg distribution system was out of commission for a few minutes following a strike on the main transmission line. A transformer was burned out near Glide.

A high wind which accompanied the storm strewn roadways with trees, limbs and other debris, while the North Umpqua road to Diamond lake was made temporarily impassable by rain, which brought new slides in the Copeland creek section where grading is in progress.

It was expected the road would be put in condition, however, for week-end use.

Continued warm weather was in prospect today, the local weather bureau office reported, although the maximum today is not expected to be as high as that of yesterday. Scattered thunder storms are expected over the mountains. Cooler weather is in prospect Friday, according to the forecast.

electrical storm experienced there in the memory of observers. Four minor fires were started in the city, several residential districts were without power for several hours and two tree and two grass fires were attributed to the bolts.

Two barns and perhaps other isolated farm buildings were destroyed by lightning started fires in its area of the Deschutes National forest from the Tuesday night storm. 75 were reported in the Willamette National forest, a score in the Umpqua forest near Cottage Grove, 22 in southeastern Clackamas and northwestern Marion counties and many others elsewhere.

In eastern Washington one ranch home was burned and two others threatened as a fire swept 15 miles through clump grass and sage of Frenchman hills. Near Wenatchee three fires burned over 6,000 acres, although the loss was not large.

Seven fires, none too serious, burned in western Washington.

Seattle Street Buckles

In Seattle, two sections of pavement buckled two feet into the air near the Boeing airplane factory plant No. 2, and the ends of old street car rails expanded so far the Spokane street and University draw bridges could not be lowered. Traffic was halted on both while the ends of the rails were sawed.

Lightning and thunder, but probably no rain, was forecast for much of the western side of the Cascades again.

KLAMATH AREA MILL AND POWER LINES DAMAGED

KLAMATH FALLS, July 17.—(AP)—Highways were blocked and a mill closed by a hurricane-like storm that struck the Klamath area late yesterday.

Two 100-foot smokestacks crashed down at the Associated Lumber company plant at Dorris, Calif. The big metal pipes fell clear of the buildings but crushed a company truck and broke power lines to the plant. The roof of the Dorris ballpark stands blew off.

State highway department crews worked much of the evening clearing a dozen trees from the Green Springs highway, and at least three trees fell across the Lake o' the Woods road. The Weyerhaeuser logging railroad was blocked by 28 trees.

Lightning flickered during the storm but pounding rain drenched fire threats. Hail battered the Parker mountain area.

National Emergency Edict Urged by U. S. Army Head

main," Marshall said, "is, 'is there an emergency?' I say there is. You gentlemen will have to settle it."

Prior to Marshall's appearance before the committee, Senators Wheeler (D., Mont.) and Truman (D., Mo.), suggested—separately—compromise draft legislation which would permit selectees now in service to leave the army after one year but require those inducted in future to serve for a longer period.

The bill before the committee—an administration measure—would remove entirely the present one-year limit on the service of selectees, members of the national guard and reserve on active duty.

Secret Weapon Reported

Reports of a new secret weapon for the nation's land forces cropped up today in connection with the administration's property seizure bill as congress pressed ahead on two other pieces of emergency legislation—the new \$3,504,000,000 tax measure and a sweeping price stabilization proposal.

The army's inability thus far to obtain the right to manufacture the reported secret weapon was said to have been described to the senate military committee as a pressing reason for quick approval of the property seizure legislation.

Some committee members said they were informed the war department was experiencing considerable difficulty in obtaining detailed plans for the weapon, described as a type of gun.

The inventor, the committee-man said, was represented as demanding an extraordinarily large sum before he would make detailed drawings available.

Under terms of the proposed legislation these plans could be seized, and a valuation set on them by the president. If the inventor declined to accept this figure, he would be paid 75 percent of the amount the president fixed and could appeal to the courts to set a final price.

Meanwhile, far-reaching revisions were predicted in the terms of the latest draft of the property seizure measure, the

third to be submitted to congress. Majority Leader Barkley said he would seek to expedite its consideration.

Lottery Occurs Tonight

The government will determine by lot tonight the order in which it will call up for military service the second group of selective service registrants.

Navy Secretary Knox, blindfolded, will dip his hand into an historic glass jar used on similar occasions of the past, and the second national selective service lottery will be off.

The lottery, on a much smaller scale than that of October 29, 1940, when 9,000 numbers were drawn, will determine priorities of service for approximately 750,000 young men registered July 1 who had become 21 years old after the first draft registration last year.

The serial numbers drawn to night will be apportioned among those held by about 8,000,000 of the 1940 registrants still unclassified.
