## MARKET REPORTS

### WOOL

BOSTON, July 18.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There has been no excitement on Summer street this week in spite of the fact that the government has just awarded contracts on a huge yardage of military fabrics and blankets. The mills evidently are well covered against their requirements either in options or prior purchases of wool.

"These contracts require about 40 million pounds of wool of which apparently 75 per cent will be domestic. This releases a considerable weight of foreign wool for use in civilian fabrics at lower prices, although it remains to be seen how far civilian business is available.

"The market here has been a bit on the soft side this week, with sales of good topmaking fine wools at \$1.00, clean basis in the original bags and good graded domestic wool at \$1.03, clean basis. Some half-blood graded territory as sold at \$1.00-\$1.02, clean otherwise, little business is reported.

"Western operations have been limited, even in the southwest, and growers have been inclined to withdraw wool from sale on current bids which have been too low to suit them.

"Foreign markets are without material change for the week. "Mohair is quiet but steady."

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## Douglas Legion Juniors Defeat Marshfield, 11-6

One More Victory Needed for District Crown May Come From Sunday's Doubleheader

The Douglas County Legion Juniors today were within one game of the District No. 4 championship as the result of a victory, 11 to 6, at Marshfield Thursday afternoon. If the Douglas county team can win one game of Sunday's doubleheader with Marshfield on Finlay field the team will win the district championship and will meet the southern Willamette valley district winner for the right to enter the contest for the state title.

The Roseburg team took an early lead in Thursday's game, scoring two runs in the first inning, after two were out, and added three in the second on two strikes, an error and a fielder's choice.

After taking what they apparently assumed to be a safe lead, the locals relaxed and became careless, permitting Marshfield to score two in the second, one in the fourth and three in the fifth, putting the home team out in front 6 to 5.

### Locals Regain Lead

The Roseburg team, however, buckled down to work in the first of the sixth, when, after two were out, Cummings drew a walk, Baker, Cox, Debernardi and Rust singled in turn, and Wimberly rapped out a Texas leaguer for two bases to push over a total of five runs before the third out was made. The final tally came in the ninth when Shaprow walked, was sacrificed to second and scored on Main's sharp single.

The locals pounded out 14 hits off Higgins and Murray, the Marshfield chukkers, while Debernardi allowed seven hits in as many innings and Main allowed two hits in the last two frames, after taking Debernardi's place on the hill. Debernardi had five strikeouts and walked two. Main whiffed four batters in two innings and walked one.

As usual, the Roseburg batting attack was paced by Glen Cox, the slugging first sacker, who had a double and two singles. Murray had two triples to lead the Marshfield hitters.

The same two teams meet here Sunday afternoon, with the first game of the double-header starting at 1:30 p. m. Marshfield must win both games to retain a chance in the district race, while Roseburg needs only one win to sew

up the title. Should Marshfield win both games, the race would be thrown into a three-way tie between Roseburg, Medford and Marshfield.

Coach Howard Parks, who expressed himself as being well pleased with the performance of the local team, has called a practice for 3 p. m. Saturday, at which time plans for the double-header will be made.
