Pension Bill's Backer Dated For Roseburg Speech



Word has just been received from Washington, D. C., that Thomas E. Boorde, above, national president of the General Welfare Federation of America, will address a gathering of pension-minded folk at the court-house in Roseburg Tuesday, July 22, at 7:30 p. m.

Mr. Boorde is on a nation-wide tour on behalf of the general welfare act, H. R. 1410, a \$30 per month pension measure introduced in congress.

The measure provides for a guaranteed federal pension of not less than \$30 per month to all retired citizens over 60, regardless of state matching. This would be in addition to any amounts paid by the states or local governments. A "gross profit" or "added value" tax of 2% is proposed as a method of financing the federal guarantee of the \$30. An ultimate goal of \$60 per month is set forth in the bill, but it is realized, the announcement said, that during the present national emergency congress cannot be expected to appropriate more than three billion dollars per year for pensions, which is what a \$30 per month payment to about nine million over 60 who would apply for the annuities would mean.

Mr. Boorde will stress the annuity theory in pensions, according to the announcement. It is his contention that all should pay, during their producing years, a small annuity premium in the form of a tax, direct or indirect, for which they will be assured of a guaranteed annuity at the retirement age.
