

Cardinals Slash Brooklyn's Lead; Feller Pins Yanks

Ernie White, the pitcher on whom the St. Louis Cardinals are pinning their National league pennant hopes, is the best lefthander in the circuit. He emphasized it by trouncing the Brooklyn Dodgers, 6-1, yesterday to split the senior circuit race wide open again.

He allowed only six hits and became the first southpaw to beat Brooklyn twice this year.

As a result, St. Louis swept the two-game series and cut Brooklyn's lead to two games before heading for a week-end in Boston.

The New York Yankees, American league leaders, also were stopped yesterday as Bob Feller pitched the Cleveland Indians to a 2-1 victory for his 19th win against four defeats. However, this still left the Yankee with a six-game lead.

Feller gave six hits and fanned nine.

Lefty Grove failed a second time to nail down the 300th victory of his career as the Chicago White Sox nosed out the Boston Red Sox, 4-3, in 10 innings.

Dutch Leonard's six-hit hurling helped the Washington Senators beat the Detroit Tigers, 8-1, with York's 18th home run accounting for Detroit's only score.

Bob Johnson hit his 18th homer with two on in the ninth inning, to spur the Philadelphia Athletics to a 6-5 margin over the St. Louis Browns.

The Pittsburgh Pirates and Boston Braves divided a double-header in the only National league action outside Brooklyn. Heintzelman pitched a four-hitter as the Pirates bagged the opener, 5-1. Three Pittsburgh pitchers allowed only six hits in the nightcap, but two singles following a walk in the ninth inning earned Boston a 4-3 edge.

Suit Against Rail Lines Assn. Ended

WASHINGTON, July 19.—(AP)—An anti-trust suit against the Association of American Railroads and 236 member companies was settled yesterday by a consent decree which the justice department said was expected to "restore to individual railroads freedom of action to enter into direct transportation arrangements with motor carriers."

Filed October 25, 1939, the suit was based on a resolution adopted by the AAR in June, 1937, which said in part that it was "not desirable for the rail carriers to enter into joint billing arrangements" with motor carriers. The AAR subsequently rescinded the resolution and sought unsuccessfully to have the suit dismissed.

The government had charged that the railroads refused to establish rates on loaded trucks, trailers and truck bodies and refused to establish through rates, joint rates and fares and joint billing arrangements with motor carriers "all for the purpose of eliminating competition and preventing the coordination of railroad and motor carrier service."

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Double Win Puts Padres in Second Place in League

San Diego loomed today as a strong threat to Sacramento's supremacy in the Pacific coast league.

Clinching their hold on second place last night with a double victory over Seattle, the Padres aimed at narrowing the eight-game gap separating them from the league-leading Solons.

While Sacramento's margin is impressive, the Padres have been slowly overhauling the leaders for nearly a month. San Diego is the first team to come within shooting range of the Solons since early in the season, when they sprinted to a 14-game lead.

After a long see-saw battle for second place with Seattle, San Diego finally jostled ahead last night with 5 to 0 and 5 to 4 victories over the Rainiers. Terry hurled five-hit ball in the opener, and only one Seattle runner got as far as third base.

The nightcap went to ten innings before Pellegrini's hit-and-run play double brought in the winning run. The Padres got their first four runs in the first frame.

Sacramento kept pace with San Diego's climb by trouncing Portland 8 to 5 and 10 to 5 in a double-header. In the first game, each team banged out three homers to knot the count at five-all by the fifth inning, but the Solons capitalized on Portland errors to win. The Solons bunched five runs in the first inning to the nightcap and coasted the rest of the way behind Hollingsworth's five-hit pitching.

Los Angeles, although badly outhit, hung its fourth straight win on San Francisco, 8 to 6. Hollywood powered to a 5 to 2

victory over Oakland's hapless Acorns.

Halifax Meets Woman Opposing Aid to Britain

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19.—(AP)—As Lord Halifax, the British ambassador emerged today from the hotel where he spoke, he came face to face with an elderly woman, dressed in black, bearing a placard which read: "We remember 1776!"

"You are against aiding England?" Halifax asked.

"I have nine sons," the woman, Mrs. Minnie J. Riise of Berkeley, told him. "I will give every one of my sons gladly to defend this country, but I will not give one of them to fight a war for another nation."

"I, too, have sons. Three of them—fighting for England," the ambassador replied. "Won't you shake hands?"

Mrs. Riise took his hand. "I have no feeling against England," she said.

Cottage Grove Softballers Trim Roseburg Team

A Cottage Grove softball team won an overtime game from a picked team of Roseburg players on Finlay field last night by a score of 10 to 9, after the local team had come from behind twice to tie the score. The main game was preceded by a good contest between Boucock's Butchers and Montgomery Ward, won by Boucock's 6 to 5.

The Cottage Grove players started off with one run in the first inning and two in the second to take a 3-to-0 lead, but Roseburg tied the score at 3-all in the second with a three-run rally. The visitors added two in the third and one in the fourth with Roseburg limited to one in the third, to hold a 6 to 4 lead. Roseburg gained one in the fifth and Cottage Grove again made it a two-run lead by pushing across a tally

in the sixth, adding two more in the first of the seventh, only to have Roseburg come back with two in the sixth and two in the seventh to tie up the count at 9-all forcing the game into an extra inning. The visitors scored in the first of the eighth and held Roseburg scoreless in the last half of the frame to win the exciting contest.

Bud Ellison, Roseburg pitcher, was nicked for eight hits. He issued six walks. Butterworth, Cottage Grove pitcher, yielded 12 hits, gave three walks, and had two strikeouts.

The first game of the evening was a Kings-X affair as Montgomery Ward was unable to produce a full lineup and forfeited the game. With a pickup team, however, the game proceeded as a very hot contest for five innings.

The press carried the statement by General Christiansen declaring that heretofore the German army has been tolerant but now has orders to take drastic action to prevent any cheers for the British.

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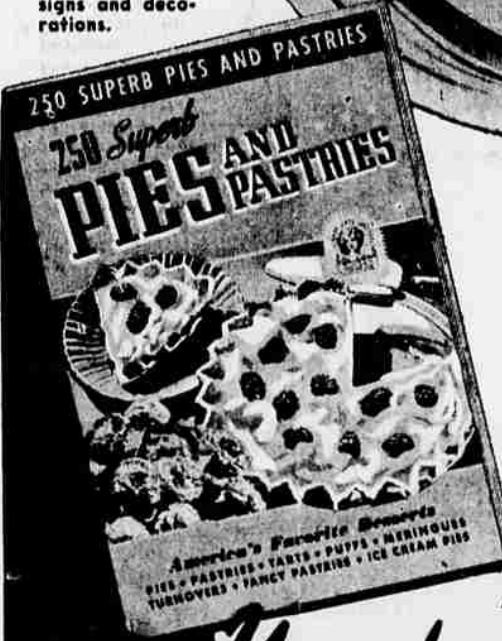
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
