Portlander Arrested in Co-Worker's Slaying

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—James Crain, 30, Portland cannery worker, was arrested today in connection with the slaying of a co-worker, Thomas Hawkins, about 30, whose partially burned body was found in a vacant lot in a Portland suburb last night, Detective James Purocell said.

Crain told the detective he and Hawkins quarreled during a beer party at the Crain home and that Hawkins attack him with a lead pipe. He said he wrested the pipe from Hawkins and struck him over the head.

Crain said he hid the body in the basement until about midnight, then strapped it to the fender of his car and transported it to the vacant lot. It was discovered there when police and firemen were summoned to a grass fire.
