

School District Clerks' Books Are Being Audited

The auditing of the clerks' books from the various school districts of Douglas county will be completed by August 1, according to W. H. Wann, C. P. A., who is doing the work. After that time the books will be re-filled with the necessary sheets, and clerks will be able to secure them at the county school superintendent's office.

Arrangements are being made for a meeting of school clerks this fall, where instruction will be given regarding the correct manner of keeping the books and making the annual reports. This instruction will be especially helpful to clerks who are undertaking the work for the first time. Mrs. Lula Gorrell, school superintendent, reports.

Office Hours Changed

Plans have been completed for a different schedule of hours in the superintendent's office. Hereafter the office will be open on Saturday afternoons for the convenience of school board members and of teachers. This arrangement should greatly increase the amount of service which can be rendered, especially to teachers in rural sections who can come to Roseburg only on Saturdays, Mrs. Gorrell states. In order to make this change possible, the working hours of the deputy will be shortened on other days of the week and on those days an assistant furnished through federal aid will maintain the regular office hours. Another change will affect the day reserved for the office by the superintendent. In the past months Wednesday has been the "day at home," but from now on the day reserved for the office will be Friday. This change is being made to facilitate visitation to the more remote school districts and to reduce mileage expense. It should be understood that the superintendent will not be out on visitation on all days except Friday; but simply that there will be no visitation on Fridays and that other days will be subject to needs and conditions.

Health Certificates

The new forms for health certificates are now available, the superintendent reports. According to the new law no tests are required except for tuberculosis. Certificates must be secured every two years by teachers under 35 years of age, and every five years by teachers over 35. However, any teacher who shows a positive reaction will be required to take the test more frequently.

Repair of library books has begun. Mending will be done on

books belonging to the regular lending library in the superintendent's office and on books in the library pool from the various districts. These books are still being received.

The semi-annual shipment of supplies have arrived from Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, including sheets for the teachers' registers and for the district clerks' books, copies of courses of study and copies of the school law. The 1941 supplements to the school laws will be inclosed with the clerk's books after the audit is completed.

Clerks' bonds are coming in daily, but some will run beyond the thirty days set by law for district officers to qualify. Until the clerk's bond is filed, the district has no clerk and can receive no money.

Right-of-Way For Pipeline Involved In Yoncalla Suit

An action brought by the City of Yoncalla against the Union Central Life Insurance company, for condemnation of right-of-way for a pipeline in connection with an extension of the city water system, was brought before the circuit court today. The case is one postponed from the regular May term, the jury having been excused subject to call at the time jury cases were concluded in May.

Selection of a jury was delayed today when the attorneys for the respective parties for the suit were granted time for an effort to reach a settlement. The attempt failed, however, and the drawing of a jury was begun shortly before noon.

The City of Yoncalla contends that the property desired for the pipe line is worth only \$50 and has offered payment in that amount. The insurance company, however, is asking a greater sum.

During the conference this morning a stipulation was reached to strike allegations made by the company concerning value of water rights from the issue and to confine the case strictly to determination of the reasonable value of the land sought by the municipality.

Purdome said the mother signed a confession saying she put the infant in four inches of water in a bathtub yesterday because she wasn't physically able to care for him.
