Willkie Urges Aid Increase to China

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—(AP)—Wendell Willkie called upon America today to redouble war aid to China as well as to Britain as a means of preventing a Japanese attack on Russia through Siberia.

"In China's ability successfully to engage the energies of Japan lies our best hope of diverting the forces of Hitler's most effective ally," the 1940 republican presidential nominee told an overflow audience at an Americans United mass meeting here last night.

Japan, he asserted, is attempting to destroy Free China, trying by force of arms to establish a second totalitarian empire in the far east.

Increased aid to China now, Willkie said, will not only prevent Japan from attacking embattled Russia through the back door, but "freed from Japan's menace in the Pacific, we shall be able to concentrate more of our strength in the battle of the Atlantic."

"Totalitarianism will thus be surrounded, blocked on all sides," he declared, "and the Nazi flood, having reached its full, will begin to recede."

"As it recedes, the conquered countries, first restless, then revolting, and the German people themselves, their faith in their leader broken under the battering of British air superiority, will somehow, some way, rid themselves of Hitler's tyranny."

"For history proves that such forces survive only in expansion."

duty may obtain a resident fishing or hunting license after six months' residence in the state.

Under the state game code, a nonresident is defined as a person who has not lived within the confines of the state for a period of six months immediately preceding his application for a fishing or hunting license.

Some service men have been under the impression that they could fish or hunt without any license whatsoever, or with a resident license, but the game commission has no power to issue any special license for the men in military service. If a man desires to fish and hunt before he has lived within the state for six months, he must obtain a non-resident license.

Men who have a furlough and wish to fish over a number of days may obtain a 10-day non-resident fishing license for \$3.
