

\$200 Verdict Given In Pipeline Case

A verdict for damages in the sum of \$200 was returned into circuit court here this afternoon by the jury hearing the case of the City of Yoncalla against the Union Central Life Insurance company in connection with condemnation of right of way for a pipeline. The jury called into adjourned session to hear the one suit, was excused from further attendance but was held subject to call.

The suit of the City of Yoncalla against the Union Central Life Insurance company, for condemnation of right of way for a proposed pipeline connected with a planned extension of the city's water system, was sent to a circuit court jury here shortly before noon today. The city has offered the company \$50 in payment for the land, but the sum of \$500 was demanded. Witnesses were called by both sides to give opinions on the amount of damage the construction of the pipeline would cause to the value of the farm lands involved. Opinions of witnesses varied from no damage to amounts of more than \$1,000.

The jury hearing the action, which was postponed from the regular May term, included Minnie Easton, Alton Hebard, C. C. Hill, Bessie Lakey, Villa LaRaut, Mary W. Love, Bee Minter, Lillian Nelson, O. D. Newhardt, T. E. Ollivant, Elsie Russell and George W. Vaughn.

The original suit contained an issue regarding the taking of water from Adams creek, which flows through the land involved in the action. This issue, however, was stricken by stipulation of the attorneys, who agreed to confine the action before the jury strictly to the damages involved in the pipeline construction. It is anticipated that another suit will be required to settle the matter of water rights unless an agreement can be reached outside court.

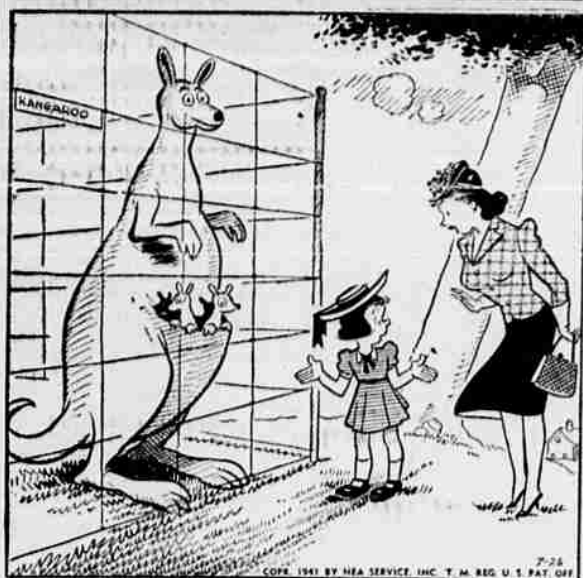

Roosevelt to Retaliate For Japanese Action

ed, "will this government follow the policy you outlined yesterday?"

Mr. Roosevelt said he could not talk about that. He said he had been describing what had happened up to the time he was speaking.

"You left the intimation that that policy might be over with," a reporter remarked.

But, Mr. Roosevelt said, he did not say as much.

"We are trying to get you to today," his questioner replied.

Smilingly the president said he knew that was the case but that he just didn't have any news along that line.

Putting up to Mr. Roosevelt what he termed a blunt question, a newsman inquired what the Japanese move into Indo-China and its implications would mean to America's neutrality.

"The president said, is a terribly 'iffy' question."

"Yes," his interrogator agreed, "but that's the interest of every American in this thing."

So many things have not happened, however, Mr. Roosevelt replied, and things that have not happened cannot be discussed. If there were some one definite line we could bank on as being the one that would happen, he said, we could talk on it. But that isn't the situation.

Japan's entry into Indo-China was a specific move, Mr. Roosevelt was reminded, and it was described by the state department as dangerous to our security.

But we do not know what the move will be tomorrow or the next day, the president asserted.

"Awareness" Lacking

In response to questions, Mr. Roosevelt said he thought the American people were no more aware of the international situation in the far east than they were in the west. But he said he had received yesterday reports from a newspaperman, two magazine writers, a cabinet member and two other persons who had been around and found that since March and April there had been a tremendous change, and the people were far more cognizant of the danger in the international situation.

Nevertheless, the chief executive declared, there still is insufficient awareness.

U. S. ATTITUDE STIRS RESENTMENT IN JAPAN

TOKYO, July 25.—(AP)—Evidence of official and popular resentment of the United States' attitude toward Japan increased today as the newspapers gave great prominence to yesterday's statement by President Roosevelt.

The government was understood to be closely studying the remarks in which the president spoke—in the past tense—of the reasons Japan hitherto had been permitted to obtain American oil.

Outside government circles, the general reaction was one of astonishment and resentment at the vigor of the statement.

The widely circulated newspaper Nichi Nichi said in comment on President Roosevelt's statement:

"Of course Japan can not anticipate what course Roosevelt's action will take and therefore she must be prepared. Hitherto the British-American strategy has been to keep Japan on the sidelines in the effort to destroy the axis powers. It is not certain that this strategy will be followed in the future."

The newspapers published arguments trying to show that the disruption of Japan's economy, while partly due to the spread of warfare, also was attributable to the United States and British economic activities inspired by motives hostile to Japan.

Despite the tension a spokesman for the Japanese cabinet information board said Japan had never given up hope of betterment of relations with the United States.

No Clue Discovered to Fugitive Oregon Convicts

SALEM, July 25.—(AP)—Prison officials still were without any clues today as to the whereabouts of two prisoners who walked away from the penitentiary early Tuesday.

Warden George Alexander said he heard a report that the men had rented a room in Portland last night, but he added that the rumor "probably is phoney."

The prisoners are Lauren F. Wallace, 33, serving three years for larceny; and Virgil J. Alkin, 38, serving five years for burglary. The men, both trustees, were armed with butcher knives.

pilots reported they left great fires raging in the German naval bases of Kiel and Emden in night raids, and also attacked Wilhelmshaven and Rotterdam and airfields in German-occupied France. The German high command asserted 33 RAF planes were destroyed yesterday.

The air ministry declared that 33 German fighter planes were shot down in yesterday's daylight attacks on the German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at La Pallice and Brest, respectively.

Some of the four-engined planes were Boeing flying fortresses from the United States.

It was not disclosed whether they had encountered Nazi fighters but it was reported reliably all returned safely to England.

The Boeings dropped American-made explosives, the ministry news service said.

Premier Mussolini's high command said Italian planes sank three more ships totalling 37,000 tons in a British convoy in the Mediterranean yesterday after sinking five ships the day before.

Live Wires Juice Two Youths, Killing One

PORTLAND, July 25.—(AP) Machinery bumped high-voltage wires in two sections of Oregon this week, taking one life and sparing a second only by a bit of rare good fortune.

At Ontario yesterday the derelict Don Comersner, 19, Oregon Slope, was moving touched a power line, electrocuting the lad.

Earlier in the week near Lakeview, Jim Ogle, Jr., 17, escaped a similar fate only because he was swinging clear of the ground when a hayrack being drawn by his father's tractor nudged a 15,000-volt line.

Although the lad did not ground the charge, he was thrown from the rack, his gloves and the soles of his shoes burned to a crisp. Attendants at Lakeview hospital said he apparently suffered no internal nor serious external burns.

were reported authoritatively at Saigon today to include the right to station warships in Camranh bay and at Saigon, several air bases in southern Indo-China and permission to post troops at several coastal points.

The Japanese, it was indicated also, have gained control of several southern Indo-China airports, where it is understood they will establish garrisons.

Both Saigon, up the Saigon river from Indo-China's southern coast and the other air, troop and naval stations mentioned are the Japanese outposts closest to Singapore, British Malaya and the Netherlands East Indies. Cambodia is on the Gulf of Siam.

side of Indo-China, along the French colony's border with Thailand.

Reports from Saigon indicated that the French were withdrawing their forces from the area to be occupied.

Fascist Editor Spouts

In Rome, the authoritative fascist editor Virginia Gayda declared the Indo-China thrust was "the first episode" in Japan's "march to the south" and was undertaken in full agreement with the other axis powers.

He declared that from Indo-China's two naval bases (presumably Camranh bay and Saigon) Japan can control the South China sea despite the big British bases at Singapore, the American bases in the Philippines and the bases in the Dutch East Indies.

The Japanese move, he declared, has taken the initiative away from the United States and Britain in building up strategic Asiatic positions.

"Now it will be seen how valid are the claims to the mastery of the world and its events which Roosevelt and his British client would like to advance," the editor wrote.

"With this new expressive episode in its march toward the south, Japan takes a clear position against the policy of Britain and the United States and boldly develops its expansive trajectory which the two Anglo-Saxon empires would like to oppose and repress," he continued.

Talk of an oil embargo and economic action "can leave Japan cold," Gayda declared, since she "now finds in Indo-China's rich territory many of those means which before came from the United States."

tween the administration and Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.), one of the severest critics of current foreign policy.

Secretary Stimson read a statement to reporters in Washington yesterday in which he assailed Wheeler for distributing cards suggesting that the recipients ask the president and congress to keep the country out of war. Some of the cards went to men in the army and Stimson said the senators action "comes very near the line of subversive activities against the United States, if not treason."

Wheeler acknowledged send-

ing out a million cards but denied that soldiers as such had been placed on the mailing list deliberately. At the same time he remarked that Stimson was "ga ga."

Mr. Roosevelt told the press today he thought his observation that he agreed with the editorial captions covered the situation. Only, he added, he had to ask the question about it.

"We were going to get around to it," a reporter assured him.
