Mrs. L. G. Weaver had charge of the program. She chose for her subject information on migrate conditions. A migrant is one who moves from place to place in search of work, and it was learned that there are two million of these moving people in the United States. She read of how crops needed to be harvested and many of the people who do this work are forced to travel from harvest of one kind to another and have no opportunity for community life. The dust bowls and droughts have caused many to become migrants. Most of the western migrants were of family type and while the man would like to keep his family together and have a home he is forced with a difficult situation. The employer is often no longer concerned after his crop is harvested except that they should move on, hence the migrant has no special place to go. Some families travel as much as 6000 miles in a year for work, wages averaging from \$250 to \$400 a year, thus causing malnutrition, lack of education and decline in health and spiritual outlook. A solution to the problem is being sought and it is given in relief, rehabilitation and spiritual security. There are groups of women of non-denominational faiths in the form of nurses and workers, who are doing much. To have appreciation and need for what the migrant has to give, is elevating to the migrant, and these workers are striving to bring a view of the better side of life through the love and hope in Jesus, and health and education for the children.
