

### All-Star Teams of Coast League To Battle Tonight

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—(AP)—The pick of the Coast league baseball players, divided into teams representing the north and the south, will line up here tonight for the first all-star game in Coast league history.

Outstanding players of the eight-club class AA league, selected by the votes of sports writers, start the benefit game in Seals stadium at 8:15 p. m.

The northern team is made up of the Stars of Sacramento, Seattle, Portland and Oakland. The southern outfit includes players from San Diego, Hollywood, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Rival managers, also named by sports writers, are two of the most colorful figures in baseball in the west—"Lefty" O'Doul of San Francisco and "Pepper" Martin of Sacramento. O'Doul is head man of the southern team and Martin will guide the north.

Martin will be aided by Johnny Vergez of the Oaks and O'Doul will have Bill Sweeney of Hollywood as his assistant.

Experts gave the edge to the northern outfit, which has the pick of the league's two leading clubs, Sacramento and Seattle.

Sacramento placed seven men on the northern squad, Seattle and Oakland four each, and Portland three. San Diego and Hollywood each has six men on the southern team, with four from San Francisco and two from Los Angeles.

Pitchers will be restricted to three innings and all members of the two squads will see action.

The southern team received a setback last night when George DeFore, San Diego catcher and named on the starting lineup, remained at home with an injured finger. Tied for third in coast league batting and hitting .341, DeFore's loss will be felt.

NEWARK, N. J., July 29.—(AP)—Champion Fritz Zivic and Challenger Freddie Cochran hope to keep their world welterweight title date tonight at Ruppert stadium after four postponements.
