PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—The national defense program was blamed last night for the increase in traffic deaths.

Lieut. F. M. Kreml, safety division director of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, said that increases in employment brought like increases in traffic volume and liquor consumption.

He predicted automobile fatalities would be the highest in U. S. history, possibly reaching 40,000.
