and automatic pistols was raging.

German Losses Heavy

Russian dispatches reported "particularly heavy fighting" and heavy German losses in the Smolensk salient, where red troops were declared to have blasted German infantry from their trenches in a series of counter-attacks.

Soviet officials said the big German drives toward Leningrad, Moscow and Kiev were stalled, with soviet armies swinging more and more strongly to the offensive.

DNB, the official German news agency, apparently describing the same Moscow-bound thrust as Hitler's newspaper, said advance German tank units east of Smolensk had cleared the surrounding countryside of Russian soldiers last night.

The tank sweep was made possible, DNB said, by the arrival of a Nazi supply column which beat off violent assaults by soviet infantry and tanks to reach its goal.

Previous Russian dispatches had pictured German tanks which lunged beyond Smolensk, on the Minsk-to-Moscow highway, as having been cut off.

Huge Battle Raging

The Berlin Voelkischer Beobachter, owned by Hitler, said a mighty battle was raging on a 190-mile front pivoting on Smolensk, extending from Mogilev, southwest of Smolensk, to Vyazma, 100 miles east of Smolensk and only 130 miles from Moscow. Russia's high command again reported "stubborn" all night fighting in the familiar sectors of Nevel-Smolensk, on the central front, and Zhitomir, on the Ukraine front in the south.

The red army was pictured by Russians generally, however, as swinging steadily more strongly to the offensive. A Moscow communique reported the Germans pushed back 100 miles in the Ukraine, and a town identified only as "N" was said to have been recaptured in a fierce, two-day battle.

Sabotage Is Claimed

OTTAWA, July 30.—(AP)—Charges of "enemy sabotage" and promises of arrests emanated from government quarters as the vast Arvida, Que., plant of the Aluminum Company of Canada resumed operations today after a five-day strike characterized officially as a severe setback to production.

While troops stood guard as a precautionary measure, Munitions Minister C. D. Howe launched an investigation into the shutdown, which began last Thursday when 300 of the 5,000 employees seized control of the plant—one of the biggest of its kind on the continent. Approximately 4,000 laborers, engaged in building an addition to the factory, struck in sympathy.

Howe termed the shutdown a "suspected case of enemy sabotage" and declared arrests "definitely will be made."

He said the seizure of control was effected by the 300 men staging "something like a sit-down strike."

Working on U. S. Order

He estimated it would be three weeks before peak production resumed at the plant, which has received orders from the United States for \$126,000,000 worth of aluminum during the past two months.

The factory, which produces virtually the entire aluminum output of the dominion—enough to build more than 50,000 war-

Dutch Express Readiness To Fight in East Indies

LONDON, July 30.—(AP)—Queen Wilhelmina of The Netherlands today declared that should circumstances arise in the East Indies "which would force a fight upon us, there is no doubt whatsoever that we would with our allies accept that fight."

She said that "in continuous consultation and close cooperation with the British and United States governments, I and my counsellors follow the development of events. Aggressive measures on the part of The Netherlands government never had to be feared, but the government are and remain determined to fight if our territory should be threatened by armed force."

Japanese Policy Draws Warning From Britain

an entirely new standpoint." Perhaps significantly, he added that it would be difficult to predict where the flames of the European conflict might spread and that the government was "doing everything within its power to mobilize all resources and manpower for any eventualities."

As he spoke, Japanese troops moved steadily into southern Indo-China bases, within striking distance of Singapore, the Dutch East Indies and the Philippines. Boat Seizure Revealed

In the economic clamp-down, business by British and American companies in Japan and throughout Japanese-occupied northern China, except in the Peiping and Tientsin foreign quarters, was virtually at a standstill.

Japanese sentries patrolled American oil properties taken under protective custody, reports to Shanghai said.

In Washington the treasury department disclosed the seizure of 19 Japanese fishing boats in Hawaiian waters by customs agents between February 28 and March 3.

Although the vessels were seized on charges of false registry, several officials at Washington charged they had been engaged in espionage and that although no suspicious equipment was found aboard the ships when they were seized they were reported to have carried radio and photographic equipment during the period they were under observation.

Most of the ships involved, these sources said, had at least one Japanese naval reservist aboard.

Six of the seized vessels already have been declared forfeited to the U. S. government. Seventy-one Japanese fishermen and three Honolulu fishing companies were indicted on the false registry charges.

Vague reports of Japanese naval officers posing as fishermen have been recurrent along the Pacific coast for many years, and

Recognition Is Given Government in Exile

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(AP)—The United States accorded full recognition today to the refugee Czechoslovakian national committee in London as the government of Czechoslovakia.

Reaffirming the American policy of non-recognition by conquest by arms, the official announcement by Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state, reestablished diplomatic relations between the two nations. Relations had been partially suspended since German occupation and division of the world war-born republic in March, 1939.

Violent Storms Felt As Heat Wave Breaks

Two cool air masses moving toward each other from the Atlantic coast and from North Dakota and Minnesota today were squeezing out the worst heat wave of 1941.

The hot spell that besieged some areas in the eastern two-thirds of the nation for nine days caused 305 deaths, 153 by heat prostration and 152 by drowning. Minnesota led the most deaths with 30; Michigan had the most drownings, 26.

Violent storms accompanied the arrival of relief in some scorched areas last night. A heavy wind, rain and electrical storm uprooted trees and caused power failures in southern and central Wisconsin as the mercury plunged from 95 to 73 in three hours in Milwaukee.
