There is a Route Via Roseburg, Too

There came to the editorial desk recently a copy of a publication called the "Shasta-Cascadian" being the official publication of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland organization.

The Shasta-Cascade organization is similar in character to other groups organized along the same line and for a similar purpose. Two of these known best to residents of the southern part of Oregon are the Redwood Empire association and the Oregon Pacific Highway association.

The issue of the publication mentioned above contains a great deal of most interesting material about Diamond lake, with more than a page of space devoted to it. But we note, with no little consternation, that the fact that the lake can be reached by road via Roseburg up the beautiful North Umpqua river, is not mentioned.

...of pointing out to the Japs the point beyond which it WON'T be safe to go.

AS to Russia, you'd better hold everything for the present. The situation there is so confused and fighting is spread over an area so VAST that anything can happen.

The Germans are still driving panzer spearheads into the Russian line, trying to surround and destroy large bodies of Russian troops. The Russians are working the same game on the Germans wherever they can.

But it is too early to draw any conclusions. The present confused situation could come to a head and change almost overnight.

REALISTIC Churchill is plainly scared of wishful thinking in England. Today he delivers another of

his blunt warnings of an invasion attempt in September— which, he points out, is the invasion season. He cautions the British to keep their belts pulled tight. "Be on guard," he says, "equally against pessimism and optimism."

The Russians, he admits, are showing "magnificent strength and courage," the battle of the Atlantic is going better and German air superiority is being broken. But he adds:

"The worst is not over. The vast mass of destructive munitions which the Germans have made or captured, the courage, skill and audacity of their striking forces, the ruthlessness of their centralized war direction and the resources of many lands which may to some extent become available to them forbid the slightest relaxation."

Hutchinson Is Hitter As Well as Good Hurler

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 31.—(AP)—Most pitchers depend upon razzle-dazzle curves or some variety of fancy throwing to win ball games, but young Freddie Hutchinson of the Buffalo baseball club goes them one better—he's a demon with the bat.

The husky, 22-year-old Detroit Tiger farmhand leading the International league in pitching with 20 triumphs against only four losses, finds that driving in runs pays dividends on his pitching record.

Although it's unofficial because, as a pitcher, he hasn't played in enough games, Hutchinson at present is the leading hitter on the Buffalo club and has a batting average of .388.

Purchased three years ago by Detroit from Seattle of the Pacific Coast league for cash and players amounting to \$75,000, Hutchinson is considered the second cleanup hitter in the Buffalo lineup when he's working.

Tuna Prices Appear Stabilized at \$170

ASTORIA, Ore., July 31.—(AP)—Tuna prices appeared stabilized at a strong \$170 a ton Wednesday in Oregon markets. The Union Fishermen's cooperative here paid \$133 for 7500 pounds caught by deep-sea fishermen off Yaquina bay.

This was 50 cents under the price paid at Newport for 9000 pounds landed by the schooner We.

A two-ton load at Depoe bay was held for higher price when bidding started at \$172.50.

High winds Wednesday forced many craft into port with damaged rigging and broken masts. The flow was moderating, however, and small boats were expected to be out late in the week.

Columbia river receipts were considered light although 40,000 pounds were landed Wednesday, and canneries were operating only every other day.

St. Louis Swept By Series Fever

ST. LOUIS, July 31.—(AP)—A wave of world series fever swept St. Louis today as the Cardinals—playing suspiciously like the world champion gas house gang of 1934—perched atop the National league with a 5-game margin over Brooklyn.

They liked the Dodgers yesterday 6 to 4 after that 31-hour tie struggle of Tuesday and fully expected to knock Brooklyn off again this afternoon in the last game of one of the most crucial of crucial series.

The Cardinals have been at or near the top all season, but the home town fans have gone down with their false hopes too often to be fooled easily. They remember 1939 when the club started too late but outplayed Cincinnati in the stretch drive only to lose by a whisker.

So when all the world series talk broke loose suddenly it was as noticeable as the heat! President Sam Breadon of the Cardinals, who estimates a pennant is worth \$1,000,000 to a city, says they haven't started printing series tickets yet—but they're thinking about it.

"I'm not making plans for the Cardinals to play in the world series because so many things can happen between now and the close of the race. But I'm rooting for the Cardinals,"

Even old Dizzy Dean, who with brother Paul, Pepper Martin, Frankie Frisch, Leo Durocher and Joe Medwick—was on that last pennant winner, is all pepped up over "our" chances.

Q. Will personal checks be accepted for bond purchases when I buy direct by mail from the treasury department, Washington, D. C.?  
A. Yes, subject to collection. Your bond will be mailed to you shortly thereafter.  
Q. Does a defense savings bond increase in value from the date of purchase?  
A. A defense savings bond is dated the first day of the month in which remittance is received by an authorized issuing agent. In other words, you get a full month's credit on your investment regardless of the month you buy your bond.  
Note.—To buy defense bonds and stamps, go to the nearest post office or bank, or write to the treasurer of the United States, Washington, D. C., for an order form.

Leningrad Said To Be Vital to Russian Defense

Berlin's quiet insistence during the past twenty-four hours that Leningrad is about to fall compels our attention. This former glittering capital of the czars is the second city of all the Russias, and one of the most important of the soviet defensive centers. Its loss would be a grave blow to the bolsheviks and would create an immediate threat to the entire structure of the Stalin defenses.

Thus while we shall be well advised to regard the situation with reserve, pending developments, the matter is insistent enough to call for a reexamination of what it will mean if the Hitlerites and their Finnish allies do get possession of this great industrial city of 3,200,000 inhabitants. Here are some vital points for consideration: Leningrad is Russia's sole remaining port on the Baltic. It is the bridge-head for a network of railroads which extend into the country in all directions. Capture of Leningrad would cut the soviet union off from its naval forces in the Baltic altogether, leaving this homeless and wandering navy to the mercy of German men-of-war and bombers.

Not only does Leningrad give Russia her all-important access to the Baltic, but it is one of the greatest industrial centers of the soviet. Here among many other products are manufactured munitions of war, machinery of all sorts, chemicals and rubber. But apart from what Leningrad means in itself, its capture would at once produce the menace of a German-Finnish turning movement against the Stalin line, which has its right flank anchored on the port of Leningrad. This menace would be multiplied if the nazis at the same time pressed their assault on the center of the Stalin line in the Smolensk area.

Defense Strategy Outlined  
Now, of course we don't know what the plans of the Russian command are to meet such a situation. It would be a seven days' wonder, however, if the nazis hadn't worked out a very definite line of strategy. Having foreseen war with Germany, they have for years been preparing for just such an emergency. We have seen the effects of that preparation in the great resistance they have made thus far. We shall get a further
