

## St. Louis Cards on Pennant March

The St. Louis Cardinals have the class that distinguishes a champion and barring a miracle—or a catastrophe—they are likely to proceed to the National league pennant.

They have plenty of pitching, fine fielding and marvelous power—eight hitters batting over .300 and one who was .299 in the last official averages. But most of all they have the stamina and courage that is required to come from behind and win the close games—the battles that count.

This was the way they beat Brooklyn yesterday, 6-4, to take a three-game lead over the Dodgers in their torrid pennant tussle. The Dodgers scored a run in the first and then were held to one scratch hit for the next five frames while the Redbirds pulled into a 3-1 lead.

The Dodgers got a run back in the seventh through an error and in the eighth Pete Reiser hit a home run with one on to put Brooklyn in front 4-3.

This only caused the Cardinals to strive harder and they immediately ripped off three runs in their half of the eighth to sew up the game. Martin Marion doubled off the rightfield wall. Don Padgett walked and Estel Crabtree singled for one run. Frank Crespi, who had four straight hits, sacrificed and Terry Moore singled for two more tallies.

### Reds in Third Place.

The Pittsburgh Pirates yielded third place to Cincinnati again by dropping a 3-2 ten-inning verdict to the Boston Braves while the Reds were pelting the New York Giants 9-0. Bucky Walters acquired his 13th triumph in the latter affair, although giving 11 hits. The Reds themselves made 16 off three New York pitchers. Ernie Lombard singled with the bases loaded once and drove in a run with another single later.

The game at Pittsburgh was a dazzer. Jim Tobin, former Pirate, allowed only one hit till the seventh and six altogether. He himself hit a double in the fifth to drive in Boston's only run in the first nine innings. In the tenth Buddy Hassett's fly was misjudged for a triple and two singles brought Boston two runs, enough to withstand a one-run Pirate counter-attack.

The Phillies and Chicago Cubs split a doubleheader. A six-run fifth inning gave the Phils the first session 8-4 Chicago captured the nightcap 5-3 and Tot Presnell pitched three-hit ball in six innings of relief.

Action in the American league was confined to two night games. Washington beat the Cleveland Indians 7-6 and Bob Feller failed for the third straight time to snare victory No. 20. He was not charged with the loss because he was removed for a pinch-hitter during a two-run tribal rally in the ninth. But with Joe Heving and Harry Eisenstat on the mound, Washington came back with two runs of its own on doubles by Doc Cramer and Cecil Travis. Feller gave nine hits in eight innings, fanned four and walked three.

The Philadelphia Athletics squeezed out a 5-3 eleven-inning victory over the Chicago White Sox with Sam Chapman accounting for all the A's runs on two homers.

## Rainiers and Oaks Play Scoreless Tie

The Seattle Rainiers got only 13 hits in 21 innings of baseball last night. This explains why they lost to the Oakland A's 3-2 in an 11-inning opener of a Pacific coast league doubleheader in Oakland and then were held to a 0-0 deadlock in a 10-inning nightcap, the league time limit because of the league was called.

Nipping Hollywood 3-2 in the first half of a doubleheader, Portland's cellar Beavers were routed 11-1 in the nightcap. Two of the Beavers' runs in the six-inning opener were unearned.

### CHOCOLATE CHIP TORTE

dash of salt  
1/4 teaspoon vanilla  
1 tablespoon (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin  
3/4 cup cold water  
2 beaten egg whites  
2 1/2 tablespoons White Satin Sugar  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped semi-sweet chocolate  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Beat egg yolks and sugar; add milk and salt, cook in double boiler until thick, stirring. Add vanilla and gelatin, softening in water. Chill until partially set. Fold in egg whites, beaten with remaining sugar. Fold in chocolate. Pour into Graham Cracker Crust, chill firm. Spread with cream; sprinkle with additional chocolate chips.



GRAHAM CRACKER CRUST  
Mix 1 1/2 cups Graham cracker crumbs and 1/4 cup White Satin sugar; cut in 1/4 cup softened butter. Add 1 tablespoon water. Press into 8-inch cake pan. Bake in moderate oven (325° F.) for 10 minutes. Cool.
