A large group of Roseburg fans attended the baseball game played last night at Finlay field as a benefit for Melvin Baker, star Legion Junior second baseman, who was injured this week. The Juniors showed their appreciation by giving the fans a good exhibition of their ability in winning from the Roseburg All Stars, 6 to 1.

The Juniors played the brand of ball which won them the district crown and which should send them to the state tournament after their double-header to be played with Albany next Sunday at Finlay field. Albany won the first of the 3-game series last Sunday by one run in a very close game.

Hitting honors last night were just about even but the Juniors' hits came with the potential scores on bases. Ward Cummings, Legion pitcher, allowed three scattered hits while three All-Star pitchers, Merritt, Brooks and Dyer, were hit for four safeties. Cox, White, Rust and Wimberly accounted for the Juniors' hits.

Both pitchers were unsteady in the first inning. Two walks by Merritt and a three-bagger by Cox accounted for two Juniors runs while the All-Stars gained their only run of the game as a result of three walks by Cummings. Aluminum Drive to Be Ended Saturday

The drive will end Saturday night, Mr. Pinniger reports, and county trucks will begin the task of assembling old aluminum from granges and towns and bringing it to Roseburg, where it will be sacked and weighed. The weights will be sent to Jerrold Owen, state coordinator, and to the office of Florentino H. La Guardia, national head of the aluminum drive.

Mr. Pinniger is sure that county contributions will fill the wire-enclosed bin in front of the chamber building, with everything from old coffee pots to hair curlers.

Arrangements have been made with the Pierce Auto Freight company to transport Douglas county's aluminum to Salem for the state weighing-in, Mr. Pinniger said. Pierce Auto Freight have given the use of their trucks without charge.

District Conference on Food Stamp Plan Held

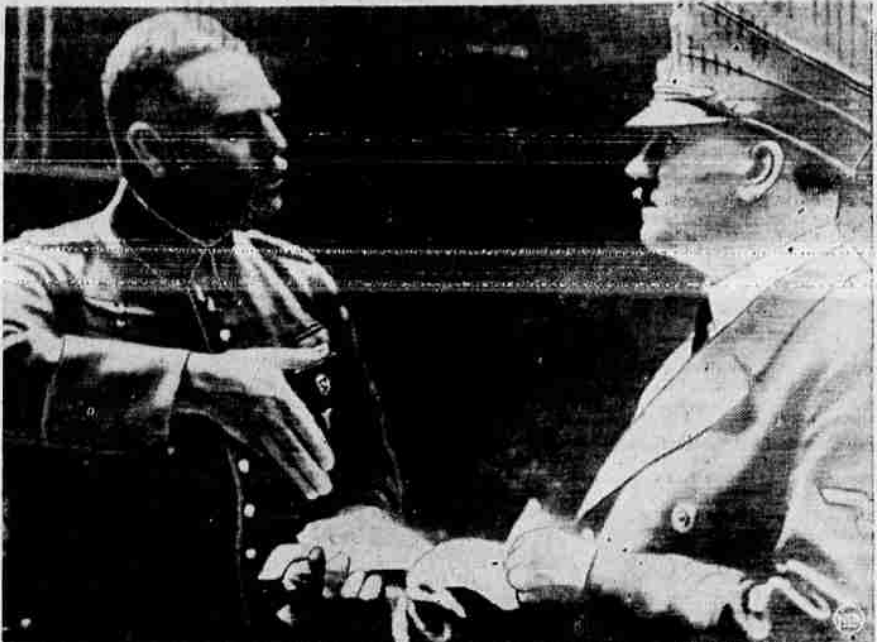

Russians Preparing Huge Counter Attack

daylight yesterday and another attack on Moscow last night. They said their own air force was pounding German ground forces.

Regiment Shattered

One German infantry regiment, harassed by land and air in the Smolensk sector west of Moscow, was reported to have lost two-thirds of its officers and men during the last few days.

The regiment, identified as the 485th, was said to have been thrown into the line to replace the crack "greater Germany" regiment previously reported annihilated. For the past three days, the Russians said, the unit has been fighting without bread or warm food and the survivors were described as exhausted.

Large quantities of German equipment have been captured, the Russians declared, and the nazis now "are showing lack of artillery and supplies."

Hopkins Sees Stalin

Hopkins, who flew to Moscow from London Tuesday, was immediately granted an interview with the most important and most inaccessible man in Russia. He said he came to see Stalin at Roosevelt's request.

(Hopkins saw his first Moscow air raid from a balcony last night, according to Erskine Caldwell, CBS Moscow correspondent. As the sirens sounded at midnight Hopkins watched the city's defenses go into action and then went down into a shelter.

This morning, Caldwell said, Hopkins took a long automobile tour of the city with United States Ambassador Laurence A. Steinhardt. The only untoward incident of the tour was a flat tire on the car. Hopkins got out, offering advice to the chauffeur, saying, "I've fixed lots of flat tires." At noon Hopkins lunched with the British ambassador, Sir Stafford Cripps.)

British Raids Continue

LONDON, July 31.—(AP)—Powerful British air raids flung from land and sea on Germany, her dominated lands from the French coast to far northern Norway and her sea lanes connecting them were reported officially today.

A severe raid by naval planes on the Norwegian port of Kirkenes, high above the Arctic circle, and Finland's Arctic port of Petsamo were announced by the admiralty.

This was Britain's first blow of the war against the little Baltic state which she befriended, giving money and offering military help, in the winter war between Russia and Finland less than two years ago.

She followed up these assaults with a new daylight smash across and English channel today, RAF Spitfires and bombers picking up

where bad weather stopped them several days ago on the German-held French coast.

The Arctic attack admittedly cost 16 British planes but the admiralty said at least four supply ships were hit, harbor works were pounded at Petsamo, four opposing planes were shot down and two hits scored on the 1,460-ton German warship Bremse, a pre-war gunnery training vessel, at Kirkenes.

(German reports described the attack as a British-Russian collaboration—the first such joint military action since the U. S. S. R. became involved—and said 25 British planes launched from an aircraft carrier had been destroyed at a cost of only two nazis. Russian losses were not mentioned.)

Oregonians Asked to Aid In Relief for China

SALEM, July 31.—(AP)—Governor Charles A. Sprague asked Oregon citizens today to contribute to United China relief "to help minister to human need and to show our sincere sympathy with the cause of China."

"Our gifts," he said, "will not only bring relief to the hungry, the injured, the dispossessed, it will bring them new faith to fight on to final victory."

pictured the whole Russian defense line from Estonia to the Ukraine being shoved back and broken.

It referred to soviet forces in the south as "defeated Russian armies" and said German forces had plunged into their retreating units in the Ukraine in a "deep thrust."

Russians Burn Forests

On the fiercely-contested Smo-

lensk front in the center, where the Russians are endeavoring to pinch off a German salient stuck through the Stalin line toward Moscow, the war bulletin reported "encirclement of the enemy east of Smolensk was further tightened." Other sources said German mopping-up there had taken a heavy toll on the Russians.

Emphasis, however, remained on the northern flank striking toward Leningrad where, Germans said, the Russians have carried their "scorched earth" strategy to the point of spraying napalm on their forests and igniting them with artillery shells to put a hurdle of fire between Leningrad and the German-Finnish drive.
