

Legion Juniors To Face Crucial Test Here Sunday

It will be do or die for the Douglas county Legion Juniors tomorrow afternoon at Finlay field, when they meet the Albany Juniors in a double-header which will decide the team which goes to the state tournament in Hillsboro later in the month. Game time is 1:30.

The local team has to win both games, as Albany already is one-up by virtue of a 3-2 victory in Albany last Sunday.

A new development appeared in the local camp today, after Coach Howard Parks had shifted Dick DeBernardi, erstwhile twirler, behind the plate in practice sessions this week. White, regular catcher, has turned in fine performances behind the plate this season, but is so small that he has difficulty in making throws to second base to nip base runners.

Albany took advantage of this in the first meeting between the two teams, and chalked up a number of stolen bases. The locals will also be without the services of Melvin Baker, regular second baseman, who suffered a mangled hand in a hay-baling accident earlier this week.

Coach Parks and his players were confident today that they could turn back the invaders, as they out-hit Albany in their first meeting, and lost the game only through untimely errors.

Main and Bigelow are expected to start on the mound for the Douglas Juniors in the twin bill, with Ward Cummings, Jr., Cox and DeBernardi in reserve.

Embargo Adds to Crisis In Far Eastern Affairs

ciency in the south Orient.

President Roosevelt's order clamped a full-fledged embargo on aviation fuel and drastically reduced the shipment of other oil supplies on which Japan depends for more than two-thirds of her needs.

Domei, the official Japanese news agency, said the measure was aimed directly at Japan, and Tokyo newspapers asserted that the United States was attempting to monopolize vital raw materials in the South seas on a preferred customer basis.

Situation Discussed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The threatening far eastern situation, with special emphasis on Japan's moves southward, were discussed today by Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state, with Lord Halifax, British ambassador, Richard G. Casey, the Australian minister, and Ralph Close, the South African minister.

Halifax and the other state department callers were reticent about discussing with reporters the specific questions under consideration but did indicate a particular interest in swift developments in the south Pacific.

Japan's massing of troops on the Thailand border and reported demand on the Thai government for facilities are of particular interest to the British because of Thailand's nearness to British Malaya.

Constantine Oumansky, the Soviet ambassador, also conferred with Welles for 45 minutes on plans to expedite shipment of American war supplies to Russia.

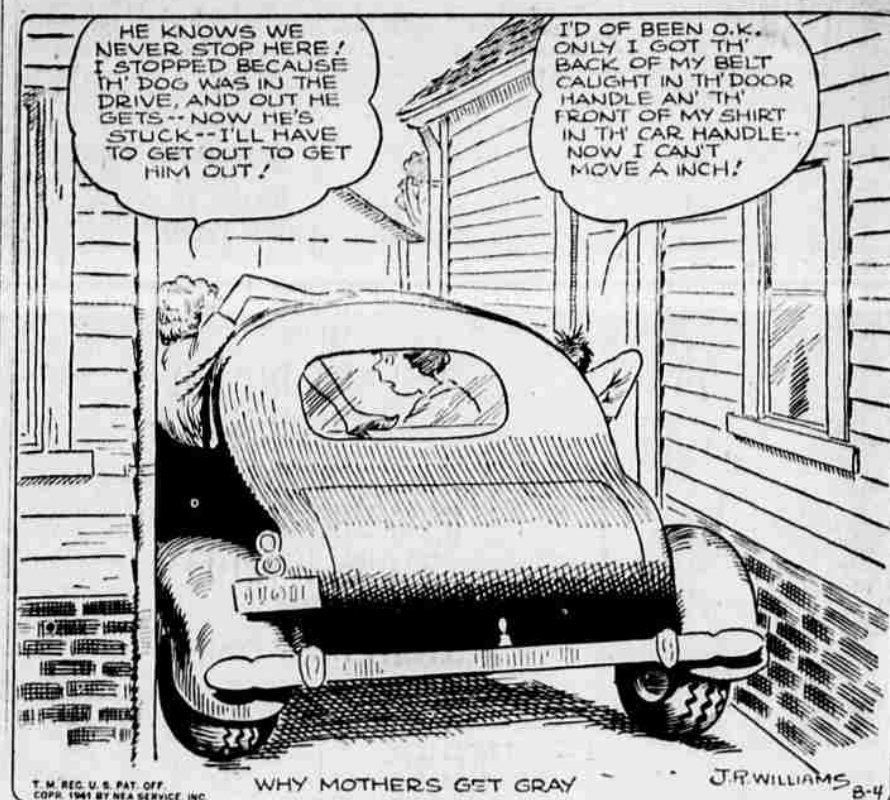

military operations and of territorial rights under pretext of 'common defense' to a power whose territorial aspirations are apparent here presents a situation which has a direct bearing upon the vital problem of American security.

"France has now decided to permit foreign troops to enter an integral part of its empire to occupy bases therein and to prepare operations within the French territory which may be directed against other peoples friendly to the people of France."

The statement recalled that in French mandated Syria the Vichy government did not resist German use of facilities there but when "the British undertook defensive operations" in Syria the French did resist. It continued:

"This government, mindful of its traditional friendship for France, has deeply sympathized with the desire of the French people to maintain their territories and preserve them intact. In its relations with the French government at Vichy and with the local French authorities in French territories, the United States will be governed by the manifest effectiveness with which those authorities endeavor to protect these territories from domination and control by those powers which are seeking to extend their rule by force and conquest or by the threat thereof."

a motor highway far east of Smolensk—apparently the Minsk-to-Moscow highway—and established another encirclement in that area. The precise locale was not given, but previous reports indicated it might be in the vicinity of Vyazma, 130 miles from Moscow.

An unofficial German summary claimed 82,000 Russians were taken prisoner from last Saturday to today.

DNB, the official German news agency, said the four towns of Nevel, Novorzhnev, Smolensk and Zhutimir—named in Soviet communiques to identify battle sectors—have been in German hands for a long time.

German military dispatches said the Smolensk sector, 230 miles west of Moscow, was littered with the bodies of men and horses and a jumble of wrecked machines.

Berlin still had no decisive news from the north front, where the Germans several days ago declared that Russia's great industrial city of Leningrad was imperiled by a giant "squeeze" movement of Nazi troops striking from the south and Finnish forces descending from the north.

Revolt Tide Rising

Behind the lines of battle, a rising tide of revolt was reported in German-conquered countries.

Silk Mills of Nation Closed by Freeze Order

Seven longshore crews rushed a million dollars worth of silk out of the holds of the Japanese motorship Helan Maru today in the climax of nearly a week of maneuvering between governments and companies for the valuable raw fibre.

Simultaneously, 69 passengers bound for British Columbia were taken from the ship and transferred to a Canadian vessel in the harbor here, quieting their fears that international crisis might force them to return to the Orient.

Unloading of the big vessel began late yesterday after officials of Nippon Yusen Kaisha, owners of the ship, had given conflicting reports of plans during a 24-hour period of uncertainty. Previously, even arrival of the ship had been uncertain because of the freezing of Japanese credits in the United States.

Filing of five libels to force unloading here was admitted by the Japanese company's officials to have been in part responsible for the final decision to set the cargo—one of the largest ever brought from the Orient to the Great Northern docks—ashore.

The Helan Maru had originally been scheduled to go from here to Vancouver, B. C., but the ship was posted last night to sail at 3 p. m., Monday, direct for the Orient.

Germans Claim 82,000 Russ Prisoners in Week

BERLIN, Aug. 2.—(AP)—An unofficial German summary of the Russian war from last Saturday to today claimed that 82,000 Russian prisoners were taken in the week.

The summary said 737 tanks were captured or destroyed and two armored trains were seized in the same period.
