

### DeGaulist Agent In France Keeping Germans on Jump

VICHY, France, Aug. 5.—(AP)—German police joined a French search today for a man described as "one of the most active de Gaulist agents" in Caen, Normandy.

He was said to have placed a wreath on a monument to French war dead last July 14 despite a ban on celebration of France's Bastille day, then shot his way out of police traps and escaped. A chief of police was wounded fatally.

The Paris newspaper Paris Soir reported the man actually was English. The newspaper said he was Jean Hopper, born in Kings Lynn, Norfolk, and used false identification papers in France.

The Paris Soir said an Englishman named Jean Hopper had a mother, wife and daughter who were in a concentration camp.

VICHY, France, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Saboteurs were reported today to have cut railway telephone and signal lines during the night at Lyon, one of the most important railway junctions in France.

Police have been seeking persons who cut telephone lines near two Lyon freight stations several days ago.

BRUSSELS, Occupied Belgium, Aug. 5.—(AP)—A German war council sitting at Antwerp has ruled that calling a Fleming "a dirty boche" constituted anti-German slander.

A Belgian shipping clerk charged with using the words in referring to a Flemish worker was given a four-month prison term.

### Census Bureau Reports Population Increasing

WASHINGTON.—The census bureau estimated today that the nation's population increased 915,647 in the last nine months of 1940 and totaled 132,584,922 on Jan. 1, 1941.

The population of the continental United States on April 1, 1940, when the last census was taken, was 131,669,275.

Since then, birth, death and immigration statistics have indicated an average growth of 102,000 per month. In the last 10 years, the average gain was 74,000 a month. Part of the fast gain was due to the fact that immigration brought in about 9,000 persons a month last year compared with a net loss from emigration in the last decade. The remainder was due to a higher birth rate.

No forecast was made of future population.

ALHAMBRA, Calif., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Former Superior Court Judge Harry F. Sewell, 52, died yesterday, but his widow was not informed.

She underwent a major operation at a hospital Wednesday. Physicians, who attributed Sewell's death to a heart attack induced by nervous exhaustion, recommended that the shock be withheld from her temporarily.

He was divorced at Las Vegas, Nev., from Mary Bell Sewell, who was granted custody of their son, Wilbur Powell Sewell. On Dec. 13, 1934, he married his secretary, Mary Virginia Platt. They had two children.
