Fire Protection Contracted

A special contract was signed with Mrs. Watzig which provides that the fire department shall be permitted to go outside the city limits to fight fires, if necessary, at the hatchery, located a short distance north of the city limits. It is the third of such contracts signed by the city, which also is providing protection for the Saar pencil stock factory and the county warehouse east of town. The contracts signed to cover industrial plants provide that payments shall be made to the city in the event the fire department is called. Owners are required to furnish facilities for fire fighting.

A petition from property owners on Parrott street, between Lane and Mosher streets, asking for the improvement of the street by the construction of concrete curbs and a gravel surface, was referred to the street committee. The petition lacked information as to whether the signatures represented a majority of the front footage on the street.

A committee which included James Young, commander of Umpqua post of the American Legion; Lloyd Crouch, chairman of the Junior baseball committee; G. V. Wimberly, George Trapalis, Roy O. Young and L. E. McClintock, appeared before the council and reported that the Legion post has incurred a deficit in its playground and Junior baseball activities. The city was asked to make a donation toward these activities and the council voted an appropriation of \$50.

road, their supply lifeline in China.

Everywhere it was agreed that Thailand was the key to the explosive situation; that it might become the Poland or the Syria of the far east.

Japan Means to Fight

Despite the explicit economic warnings which the United States and Great Britain have delivered to Japan in the form of asset freezing and fuel embargoes, informed sources here believe Japan is determined on the plunge.

On the other hand Britain, backed by the United States, is represented in many quarters as determined to halt the Japanese advance at long last, and convinced now that a military move is the only effective means.

Most observers believe that Japan is getting ready now to attack both southwest Asia and Siberia whenever this is expedient, but since any campaign against Russia probably would be protracted, Japan would be forced to risk naval hostilities in the south Pacific in order to assure a supply of raw materials, especially oil.

Japs, Russians Clash

A Japanese army spokesman admitted today that Japanese and Russian troops had clashed near the Manchoukuo-Siberian frontier, while authoritative quar-

ters in London reported that Japan had "substantially" reinforced her Manchoukuo garrison of a quarter million men.

Dispatches from Shanghai said the Yellow sea port of Dalren, point of entry to Manchoukuo, was swarming with Japanese troops, horses and artillery, and that large quantities of munitions and other supplies were constantly moving through the streets.

With Washington-Tokyo relations increasingly tense, all Japanese ships had left U. S. Pacific coast ports today and reports from the far east indicated that no more vessels flying the flag of the rising sun would be seen in American ports for some time.

600 Americans Stranded

In Washington, Secretary of State Cordell Hull said yesterday that immediate consideration would be given to the problem of removal of Americans from the orient. More than 600 United States citizens were stranded in Japan alone when the Tokyo government suddenly cancelled the departure of Japanese vessels for the United States.

Lieut. Col. Akiyama, official spokesman for the Japanese forces in China, deprecated the clash between Japanese and Russian troops, asserting that neither government had protested the incident and that there had been frequent unimportant skirmishes along the frontier in recent years. Both sides, he said, had minimized them by tacit agreement.

Akiyama said the brush occurred about two weeks ago near Manchull, just inside western Manchoukuo, when soviet troops crossed the frontier and exchanged shots with the Japanese. One Japanese was wounded, he said, while soviet casualties were unknown.

mans to abandon frontal attacks in the Smolensk sector and to direct their fury in drives south of Leningrad and on the grain-ripening fields of the Ukraine.

Nazi reports from the front indicated the Germans might be planning to by-pass Kiev and drive on to the Russian industrial center of Dnepropetrovsk, 185 miles southeast of Kiev on the Dnieper river. Dnepropetrovsk is the site of heavy armament works and the center of a huge coal, iron and manganese producing region.

Moscow had its 12th air attack last night but reported only a few raiders broke through and dropped incendiaries.

U. S. Pledges Aid

The United States, meanwhile, cast the weight of "all economic assistance practicable" in support of Russia's life-and-death struggle against the nazis.

The assistance would be in military supplies and implements of defense, even though the Japanese controlled press in recent weeks has been printing veiled warnings against the routing of such shipments across the Pacific to the Russian Siberian port of Vladivostok.

Indications that such a route would be used were seen in the state department's announcement that "favorable consideration" was being given Russian requests for the extension of available American shipping facilities to expedite the shipments.

(The neutrality act combat zone blocks off soviet European ports to American shipping.)

The formal undertaking to supply economic aid was set forth last night in an exchange of diplomatic notes, connected with the renewal of the annual Russo-American trade agreement.

Officials emphasized that there was no question of lease-lend aid, because Russia was able to pay for its purchases here.

The possibility of using American ships on the Vladivostok run raised speculation in some diplomatic quarters whether some of the lease-lend aid to China might be carried along with Russian cargoes for delivery to Chungking over the caravan route from Siberia.

Defense Tax Measure Awaits Senate Action

hear an explanation of the bill by treasury experts tomorrow and begin a two-weeks public hearing on Friday.

George expressed doubt that the senate would make any change in the fundamentals of the excess profits tax plan approved by the house.

The base-broadening mentioned by George would be in line with President Roosevelt's views, for the chief executive told the ways and means committee he thought the exemptions for single persons should be reduced from \$800 to \$750 and those for married persons from \$2,000 to \$1,500. Mr. Roosevelt asserted that persons in those income groups were eager to "chip in directly" to help the defense program.

Taxes Heavily Upped

As it passed the house yesterday, the bill would virtually triple the taxes of persons in the lower and middle income groups by levying a graduated system of surtaxes starting at five per cent on the first dollar of taxable income and ranging up to 75 per cent (the present maximum) in incomes of \$5,000,000 and over.

These surtaxes would be in addition to the present normal income tax rate of four per cent, which was continued. But even at that, a married man earning \$2,500 and having no dependents would pay \$38.50 under the new plan compared with his present tax of \$11.

The new yield from individual income taxes were expected to be in the neighborhood of \$829,000,000.

Application Widespread

Besides the direct taxes on both individuals and corporations, the bill would impose almost 40 new or higher excise taxes on commodities and services to raise about \$880,000,000. These levies included a \$5 annual use tax on all passenger automobiles, a five per cent tax on everyone's monthly telephone bill and 10 per cent excises on a host of things such as luggage, jewelry, furs, cosmetics, business machines and musical instruments.

Responsible officials expect the nation's total revenues this fiscal year to approximate \$12,500,000,000, including the \$3,206,200,000 estimated yield from the pending tax bill. Spending, however, is scheduled to be in excess of \$22,269,000,000, for a deficit of nearly \$10,000,000,000. The same sources forecast a national debt of \$57,850,000,000 by June 30, 1942, the end of the fiscal year.

are 28 or older would be released as soon as possible and transferred to a reserve component of the army.

The compromise must yet be approved by the senate. It contained no reference to labor or industry, though the original senate proposal provided for seizure of plants where stoppages interrupted defense production.

Senator Wheeler charged yesterday that the army was waiting for the service extension bill to pass so that it could offer legislation authorizing the use of selectees and guardsmen outside of the western hemisphere.

The Montanan, long a foe of administration foreign policy, said he was agreeable to a prompt vote on the extension bill, but he promised an energetic opposition filibuster against any subsequent proposal for use of the men beyond hemisphere confines.

Quick Aid Given Defense Plant Crippled by Theft

DETROIT, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Toolmakers in two plants crippled by thefts of precision instruments went ahead on full defense production schedules today, thanks to quick help from rival companies and private citizens.

Heavily engaged on defense work, the Majestic Tool and Manufacturing corporation and the Central Machine company were invaded early Sunday by thieves who stole several thousand dollars worth of micrometers, gauges and other instruments.

A halt to production appeared inevitable. Meanwhile, the federal bureau of investigation started an inquiry to determine if saboteurs were responsible. Then the help started coming in to grateful managements.

SALEM, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Bonneville administration's application for permission to erect power poles in Salem's downtown area, in connection with the Salem Electric Cooperative's proposal to serve the city, was rejected last night by the city council.

J. McGowan, Bonneville representative, said, however, that the poles now could be erected on private property.
