

Draft Holdover Plan Defended By Senator Pepper

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Defending administration legislation to extend the military service of selectees, national guardsmen, reserves and enlisted men, Senator Pepper (D., Fla.) told the senate today that "these men will be in the army five years—maybe ten."

Attacking a compromise proposal to limit such service to one additional year, Pepper asserted that congress ought to be willing to grant the president authority to keep the rank and file in uniform as long as they were needed, retaining the right to terminate such authority.

Although the pending legislation originally called for an indefinite extension of service, administration leaders have agreed to limit the tenure to 18 months more than was provided originally. In the case of selectees, guardsmen and reservists, this would provide maximum service of 30 months, since originally congress limited their peacetime service to one year. Regulars could be held for 18 months beyond the specified periods of their enlistment.

The Florida senator said he feared that many in this country had gained a false sense of security because Russian forces had succeeded in halting the German invaders at least temporarily.

"I fear that the British, too, have been lulled into a temporary feeling of security, thinking that they may not be called upon for the last desperate struggle to preserve their lives and liberty," he went on. "Let them not be deceived. This war will not end until Armageddon has been fought."

While Pepper spoke, administration leaders sought to rally their forces to defeat an amendment by Senator Burton (R., Ohio) which would limit to one year additional service that might be required from the army rank and file. The chamber rejected an attempt yesterday to hold additional service to a six months limit.

still have withstood the German power drive. But the military successes documented by the special announcements "far surpassed expectations," the high command declared.

It was insisted again that strategy called less for so-called prestige successes such as capturing big cities than in the destruction of Russian fighting power.

Even as the high command, with a flourish of trumpets, was broadcasting that Hitler's armies are ready and confident for new

drives DNB, reported widening of a gap in Russian fortifications south of Kiev by capture of 21 bunkers.

Russian counter-attacks, made partly with tanks, collapsed and prisoners were taken, the agency said.

The regular, daily war bulletin, issued separately from the lengthy review, said Moscow had been pounded again overnight by the Luftwaffe. "Many tons of explosives and tens of thousands of incendiaries were dropped and hits scored on airplane and supply factories," it said.

German planes were credited also with blasting rail facilities southeast of Kiev, including the destruction of bridges over the Dnieper river. In the Voznesensk district along the Bug river in this area German reports said their air bombs wrecked tracks and a depot, blew up a munitions train and destroyed 12 grounded Russian planes.

Blows at Britain

A 6,000-ton freighter was sunk off the British east coast by air attack, another was damaged and ports and air bases were attacked, said a DNB report.

In British raids on Germany, eight British planes were said to have been downed. Fires were admitted to have been spread at various places, chiefly Karlsruhe and Mannheim, and the communiqué said some civilians were killed and wounded.

Approximately 20,000 tons of Russian merchant shipping were destroyed by German warplanes in a raid on the Russian Black sea port of Nikolaev, informed sources reported.

A number of the vessels were set afire and others were damaged so severely as to make their loss certain, these sources declared.

RUSSIANS CLAIM THEIR LINES STILL HOLDING

MOSCOW, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The red army today met the German offensive in the Ukraine with counter-attacks such as those which threw back the nazis in the central sector last week.

While mobile fighting raged at places along a 350-mile front from the Smolensk region west of Moscow to Bel Tserkov, south of Kiev, firmly entrenched Russians were reported turning back successive assault waves of German infantry in the northwest—in Estonia and south of Leningrad.

The Russians reported today that a transport ship—presumably German—laden with troops and arms, was sunk in the Baltic sea by a soviet submarine, as fighting flared with renewed intensity along the entire Russian-German battlefield.

A Moscow communique declared the red army still was holding off the German onslaught in the four main sectors along the Estonian front, in the Kholm area 180 miles south of Leningrad, at Smolensk where fighting entered its fourth week, and in the Bel Tserkov section of the Ukraine.

Moscow had its 13th night raid of the war. The alarm lasted at most three and a half hours but

preliminary reports indicated there was little damage.

RAF BOMBS INDUSTRIAL CITIES OF GERMANY

LONDON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Dogged by bad flying weather on its way to and from western Germany, a large force of British bombers found clear skies over Mannheim, Frankfurt and Karlsruhe last night and unloaded explosives with conspicuous success, the air ministry said today.

Other bombers raided Aachen and Osnabrück during the night and a Beaufort plane of the coastal command was credited with scoring a pair of direct hits on a German supply ship at Nantes.

German planes were reported striking back at England by daylight. Some raiders were said to have been sighted over the south coast after noon.

clined at first, the officers were told, to state the nature of her illness, but while others were absent from the room she informed Mrs. Rietz of the disposition of the child.

Officers Exhume Body

The two men immediately carried their information to the district attorney and Sheriff Cliff Thornton. State Policeman Paul Morgan, Deputy Coroner E. L. McCurdy, Deputy Sheriff Bud Carter and the sheriff and district attorney immediately went to the Hanson home where the body was uncovered. Dr. E. J. Wainwright, acting county physician, also was called and stated that his examination indicated the child had lived for a short time after birth.

Mrs. Hanson was removed to Mercy hospital and her husband is being held in the county jail pending the filing of formal charges.

Jury Views Body

Coroner H. C. Stearns reported today that it is not expected an inquest will be held, but in the event of a possible official in-

quiry he today selected a jury composed of Perry Foster, C. J. Grimm, Wallace Rapp, C. H. Meusch, J. B. Fullerton and Roy Catching.

The jury was summoned to view the body of the infant and will then be excused until a decision is reached regarding an official inquest. In view of the fact that both parties to the alleged crime have made statements to officers, it is quite probable, the district attorney stated, that the case will be taken directly to the grand jury.

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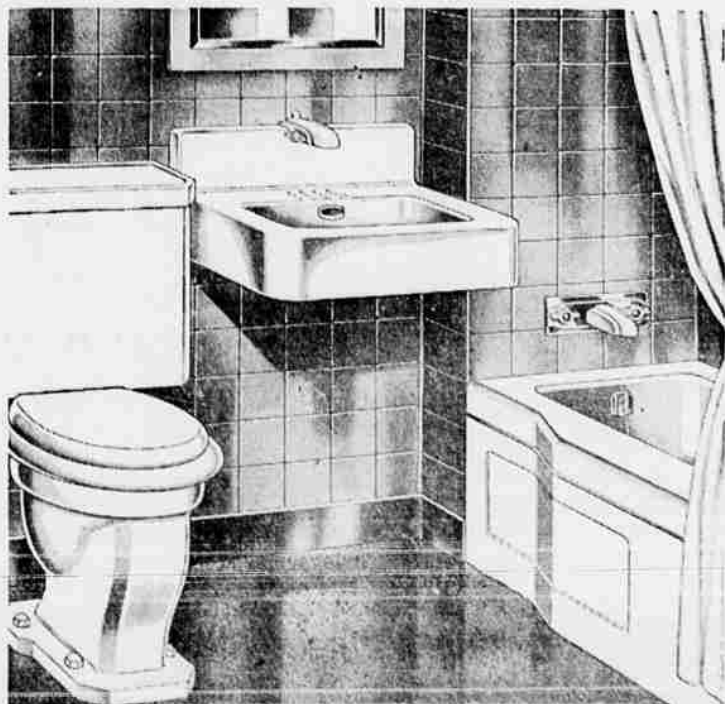
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
