Diseased Fish Not Released, State Game Board Says

Rumors that diseased fish were being released from the state game commission hatchery at Rock creek were emphatically denied today by officials of the commission in a statement telephoned to the Roseburg News-Review today from the commission's headquarters at Portland. The commission reported that a few diseased fish had been found in the steelhead holding pens and that Dr. Francis Griffith, game commission biologist, was at the hatchery assisting in the control of the disease. All of the affected fish, it was reported, have been isolated, but none will be released until they are fully recovered from the malady. In fact, it is stated, no fish may be released from any game commission hatchery until their condition has been approved by the chief biologist or his deputies. The game commission, it was stated, has had several reports and complaints that diseased fish have been liberated and it was asked that the public be informed there is no truth in these rumors. The hatchery, it was stated, has released a number of Utah rainbows, because of the overcrowded condition of holding ponds, but these fish were in perfect condition at the time they were turned into the main river.

WOOL
BOSTON, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "There is a fair demand for wool continuing this week, chiefly for fine wools but to some extent also for medium descriptions, at firm prices throughout the list."
"Western buying, also, has been fair, although restricted chiefly to Wyoming, Texas and New Mexico and to some extent to South Dakota. Prices in the west, also, keep firm, with landed costs for fine and fine medium wool mainly in the range of \$1.00 to \$1.05, clean basis."
"Reports from the goods market indicate continuing interest in both men's and women's wear, often times for delivery into the first quarter of next year, with consumption of wool continuing at a peak of about 85 million pounds, greasy equivalent, monthly."
"Foreign markets offer little new. Valuations for the next clip in Australia will commence in Sydney, next Monday."
"Mohair is firm, although still quiet, so far as new business is concerned."
