A program for the afternoon at the park, which time was spent in the park, was given by Mrs. Earl Agee.

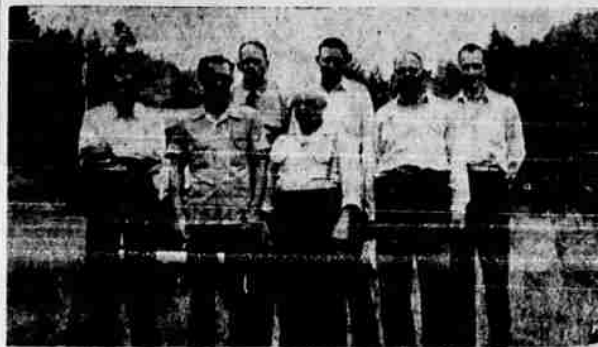
