U. S. Officer Jailed for Pistols Sale to Chinese

SHANGHAI, Aug. 9.—(AP)—United States District Attorney Shields said today that Samuel Titlebaum of Chicago, assistant U. S. marshal attached to the United States court of China, had been arrested on charges of selling two pistols, the property of the United States, to a Chinese police officer.

The Chinese, who is under the authority of the Japanese puppet regime, was said to have paid 4,400 Chinese dollars (\$220) for the two pistols and then presented them for registration with settlement police.

Titlebaum was unable to raise \$5,000 bail and was jailed.

The Central China Daily News, owned by Wang Ching-Wel, Japanese puppet who heads the Nanking regime for China, was destroyed tonight by an explosion. Police attributed it to time bombs.

Almost a block of adjoining properties was razed by the ensuing fire.

Lightning Causes Two Small Fires in Douglas

Two small fires resulted Friday from lightning strikes, one in the Camas valley district and the other near Diamond lake, according to the reports from the Douglas Forest protective association headquarters and from the office of the Umpqua National forest. Neither fire caused any damage.

The forest service headquarters reports that Supervisor V. V. Harpham has gone to Diamond lake for a week's inspection tour in that area, and Ray Hampton, fire assistant, is spending a week in the North Umpqua district.

Ward Store Workers to Get Jobless Benefit Pay

SALEM, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The state unemployment compensation commission announced today it would pay benefits to approximately 750 employees of the Portland Montgomery Ward and company unit, who were thrown out of work by the big store's closure on May 3.
