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Thanks For the Help

RESIDENTS of Roseburg were given an excellent demonstration Thursday night of the initiative and efficiency of the U. S. army in periods of emergency. When the fire siren summoned the fire department and drew hundreds of spectators to the Metzger mill, the throng racing to the scene included a great number of the officers and men of the 17th infantry, which spent the night in Roseburg.

The soldiers had every right to sit by as spectators. They had nothing at stake and were merely looking about town for entertainment. Instead of sitting idly by, however, they exhibited the effects of army discipline by quick and orderly mobilization, were divided into units, assigned to tasks and without delay of any kind and with the utmost courtesy, yet firmness, took over the job of policing the fire zone, holding back the crowds, protecting the safety of spectators and preserving room for fire department operations. Others joined the active fire fighters and risked the dangers of fire fighting side-by-side with the city firemen. Even officers drove into the fire with nozzle crews and gave service which was most highly praised by Fire Chief J. S. McDonald and his men. Other of the soldiers formed crews to protect neighboring residences, climbed to roof tops and beat out embers.

It was a voluntary act, a duty well performed, and one for which the residents of Roseburg should be extremely grateful.

The Steelhead Are Going Through

MONDAY of this week we printed in this column a letter from a Douglas county resident who stated his belief that the two lines of pickets across the river near Rock creek, known as fish racks, are stopping the summer run of steelhead. We stated that we would give the fish commission ample opportunity to answer the criticism. The racks are installed and operated by the fish commission. If the racks are not doing any damage to the steelhead run we certainly want to publish such proof of that fact as the commission can offer.

And the fish commission did have a very satisfactory way of answering. Lee McCarn, hatchery superintendent for the commission, simply invited the News-Review editor to go and see with his own eyes. He invited others who have had misgivings about the racks—including the author of the above mentioned letter. None of the others accepted the invitation, however. Steelhead are passing through the racks apparently without any trouble at all. We saw them going through zipping at the rate of one about every two minutes. Some of them were good big fish too. There was not the slightest doubt in the minds of any of the group who watched the racks yesterday morning. The steelhead are going upstream. The racks are not stopping them.

HERE'S the nub of the Far East situation to date: The Japs as yet haven't started shooting.

IN London, Major Clement Attlee, government leader in the house of commons, pinch-hitting for Churchill (there's a rumor that Churchill and Roosevelt are meeting privately on a warship at sea) announces that in July 459,000 tons of AXIS SHIPPING were sunk, damaged or put out of action by the British.

Ship sinking, you see, is a game that two can play at.

ON the home front: Leland Olds, chairman of the federal power commission, discussing the subject of daylight saving with the house interstate commerce committee, says: "The present known limits of the defense program will require 100 billion kilowatt hours by 1943, and about HALF that will have to be taken from normal commercial uses."

He adds that daylight saving is designed to PREPARE THE PEOPLE for a wide range of power curtailments.

THERE will be a lot of curtailments coming to us as we proceed along the road from a peace time to a war time basis.

The extent of these curtailments will be determined by the extent to which we are able (or willing) to INCREASE PRODUCTION.

If we could all of us, workers and employers alike, bring ourselves to take ALL THE HOLDERS off production we could probably produce so unbelievably much that the strain of all-out defense preparation would be felt very little.

"Forget-the-War" Party Proves To Be Great Success

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 8.—(AP)—A young married couple who invited 2,500 persons to a \$300 party at their six-room home last night "to become better acquainted and forget war talk" called the affair "a great success."

The hosts, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Curry Jr., said: "We had a swell time and everybody thought it was a grand idea. We think that if everyone would be more friendly with each other and have a good time, the world would be a better place for us all."

Curry, a 26-year-old bank clerk, thought up the idea. He invited all the residents of his voting district—but talk of politics, war and such stuff was banned. Instead the guests, ranging from little tots in bright summer outfits to beaming grandparents, sipped soda pop, ate ice cream out of paper cups, sang popular songs, chatted and were entertained with accordion and piano selections.

"They all didn't fit into the parlor at once, of course, but there was room elsewhere about the front lawn, driveway and back yard. No one counted the guests. There were probably several hundred."

Even Mrs. Curry's professor at the University of Pittsburgh, where she is studying to be a doctor, got the spirit of the affair.

"In view of such an important gathering," he told her class, "your examination on nitrogen and phosphorus compounds is postponed until Monday."

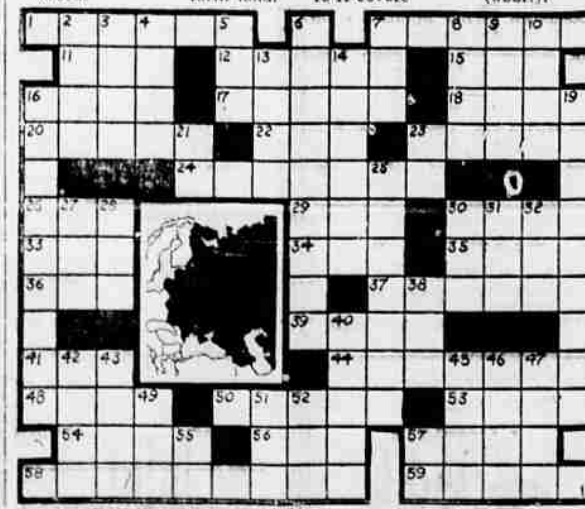

National League Seesaw Again Puts Brooklyn on Top

The tangle in which National league pennant contenders have managed to involve themselves may straighten itself out to some degree during the week-end.

The Brooklyn Dodgers are on top the heap today by three percentage points although tied in won-lost reckoning with the St. Louis Cardinals, who play three games in two days with the third-place Pittsburgh Pirates.

Pittsburgh, making a great drive, stumbled 1-0 yesterday on a one-hit pitching performance by Erickson, who hadn't won a game for the Chicago Cubs previously this season.

All that kept Erickson from the pitching hall of fame was a single by Elliott in the seventh inning.

Brooklyn came through yesterday with its seventh straight victory as Wyatt pitched six-hit ball to bulldoze the Boston Braves, 6-2. Led by Medwick with a homer and double, the Dodgers rolled up a dozen hits off Tobin and never were in trouble.

An 11th-inning homer by Young brought the New York Giants a 3-2 triumph over the Phillies in the only other National league tilt.

The slide of the New York Yankees continued with a 5-3 defeat by the Philadelphia Athletics in a night engagement which Bob Johnson won with his 20th circuit smash with two on in the fourth.

The second-place Cleveland Indians were idle, but profited by a half-game.

The third-place Boston Red Sox outthrew Washington, 16-14, and bunched their blows for a 15-8 triumph over the Senators, who haven't won a game played in Boston this year.

The Chicago White Sox rode roughshod over the St. Louis Browns for a 16-2 conquest.

Roseburg Troops Ask Recreation Building Needs

Faced with another 18 months of service, members of Co. D, 162nd infantry, the Roseburg national guard company, are anxious to secure additional equipment for their recreation building, according to a letter received by the chamber of commerce today from Wallace G. Robertson, first lieutenant and commanding officer of the Roseburg company.

The company has two ping-pong tables, Lieutenant Robertson reports, and curtains and shades will be provided for the windows of the recreation hall. Among other facilities needed, however, are three folding card tables, a combination radio-phonograph, lounging chairs, one or two davenport, a number of straight back chairs, lamp stand, ash trays, checker sets, chess sets, jigsaw puzzles, cards, poker chips, book racks, pictures, etc.

As the company has no funds with which to purchase any of these facilities, donations are requested. The club room contains four rooms, one 21 by 24 feet, another 12 by 12 feet, and two 8 by 12 feet. While floor coverings for these rooms are not essential, they would be appreciated if persons have rugs which are not being used and which they would care to donate. Lieutenant Robertson states, The company also would like to have transportation for the piano now at the armory.

The Roseburg chamber of commerce will accept donations of any of the articles listed and will see that they are delivered to the company at Camp Murray, Wash., Harry Pinniger, secretary, reports.

Carl Neal To Aid Army in Forest Defense Program

FORT LEWIS, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The army called upon national forest service men, CCC members, soil erosion officials and highway department workers in Oregon and Washington today to form a vast civilian army to aid in operations of the defending force and guard against forest fires in the coming Pacific northwest war games.

Forest service lookout stations will be looked up to report progress of the invading enemy and resident highway employees will be used in an advisory capacity on roads. The entire group will check on forest fire conditions and guard against any serious blazes.

About 100,000 soldiers will take part in the maneuvers, which start at midnight Saturday.

Carl Neal, superintendent of the Snoqualmie national forest, will act as liaison officer between the 4th army and civilian forces.

Carl Neal was formerly supervisor of the Umpqua national forest, with headquarters at Roseburg.
