Crevasse Yields Body of Brigham

LONGMIRE, Mr. Rainier National Park, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The body of Leon Brigham, Jr., 21, killed in a plunge into an 85-foot glacier crevasse, was carried 7,600 feet down Mt. Rainier last night.

Two rangers descended into the icy crevasse in Carbon river glacier on ropes to dig the body of the University of Washington football player out of a huge pile of snow which had cascaded after him when he fell Sunday while testing a snow bridge across the opening.

Brigham's father, Leon Brigham, Sr., Seattle high school football coach and former mountain guide, was at the lip of the crevasse when his son's body was discovered. The elder Brigham had abandoned mountain climbing after being involved in a fatal accident near the summit of Mt. Rainier in 1929, but took to the treacherous slopes again Sunday night in the hope of aiding his son.

Young Brigham's body was frozen, but rangers said he might have been killed in the fall or have suffocated under the pile of snow.
