Joseph Stalin's anguished cry that the armies of red Russia are in the field of battle defending their blood for freedom, sound a bit weird to American ears, accustomed as they are to reports of liquidation and mass murders coming out of Russia during the regime of this same Stalin. Two years ago Litvinov, the one Russian commissar of foreign affairs, who commanded the confidence of outside governments, was relieved of his portfolio, and an undetermined number of appointees were shot. A little earlier a purge had been conducted in which a small army of Russian officers estimated as high as 30,000 was put to death. The mass killings of peasants and civilians has been estimated at 17,000,000. Now this Litvinov suddenly appears at London and pleads for a blow at Germany which will relieve the pressure. The freedom enjoyed by the churches of Russia is a matter in which Christians everywhere have a great interest. If Russia succeeds in defending freedom and liberty, will it be the same brand heretofore enjoyed in Russia by those who are suspected of holding opinions contrary to those held by Stalin. The meaning of freedom is a badly confused meaning. Amen.

Canadian Women Storm Stores to Get Silk Hose

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Women stocking up on silk hose have caused such a run on supplies in Canada that some stores are sold out and others have limited sales.

Canada froze non-essential supplies of silk at midnight last Saturday as a war-time measure, one week after the United States ordered stoppage of raw silk processing. On Monday morning hosiery counters were jammed by women, some buying as much as \$100 to \$200 worth of stockings. A local department store official said last night that women "are in practically before the store opens and you can't get them out at night."
