increases. They have proposed drastic changes in their operating rules to reduce expenses and give management more discretion in work assignments.

Enormous Sum Involved

Authorities disagree upon how much money is involved in the dispute. Union men say \$300,000,000 or \$700,000,000, but the railroads figure it at \$300,000,000. Under the machinery set up by the railway labor act, the unions and the carriers spent almost two weeks trying to negotiate an agreement. These conferences ended in a deadlock August 5, and the unions proceeded to poll their membership on the question of a strike. The results have not been announced.

PROPELLER PLANT UNION VOTES TO END STRIKE

CALDWELL, N. J., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Striking members of an AFL machinists union voted unanimously today to end their walkout at the propeller plant of the Curtiss-Wright corporation which has \$100,000,000 in defense orders.

The members of lodge 703, International Association of Machinists, at a special meeting voted to accept recommendations by their delegates to a national defense mediation board conference in Washington yesterday that it would be best to end the strike. The delegates told them they were "not gaining anything by staying out now."

The strike started Friday as an unauthorized demonstration by a group of welders and later was taken over by the AFL union. It followed by one day a national labor relations board election won by an independent union, Propeller-Craft. The AFL announced intention to appeal on the ground the independent body was "company-aided" in its election campaign.

toward the important Leningrad-Moscow railway line.

This was followed today by a Russian army report that the German 39th tank corps, 11 other divisions and 13 regiments have been routed on the western and southwestern sectors of the front and that "the situation again had become stable and quiet."

Reds Admit Nazi Gains

Russians failed to mention action in that sector but admitted German forces to the north had reached the area of Staraya, Russia, 80 miles from the Moscow-Leningrad railway and 140 miles southeast of Leningrad. They admitted, too, that Smolensk, the gateway to Moscow, had been abandoned.

Aerial activity by both sides was apparently heavy. The Germans said that in 24 hours they had brought down 184 Soviet planes while losing four of their own; the Russians said they brought down 43 German planes with a loss of 35 of their own.

British Destroyers Bombed

Axle warplanes successfully bombed two British destroyers off the North African coast and a fascist submarine sank an 8,500-ton steamer in the Atlantic, the Italian high command reported today.

The same submarine torpedoed another merchant vessel in the Atlantic, a Rome communique said, but it did not claim the ship was destroyed.

Italian warplanes also were reported to have bombed the off-raided British Mediterranean island base of Malta again during the night.

For the second successive day the Italians acknowledged that British warplanes had raided the

North African ports of Tripoli, Derna and Bardia.

Bad weather forced a lull in the German-British air war overnight, however.

In Istanbul the official Turkish radio said British and Russian assurances on the Dardanelles were welcome and expressed Turkish anxiety for peace.

Political circles in Ankara expressed belief Britain and Russia would soon move to occupy Iran and that Turkey would probably stand aside.

The Chilean chamber of deputies received a bill to outlaw nazi organizations while a pro-German deputy asserted that 95 per cent of the army officers were pro-German.

Suez Zone Raided

Partial destruction of a British munitions dump near besieged Tobruk, Libya, and raids against British air bases along the Suez canal were reported today by the German high command.

Informed quarters said that Ismailia, airport, near the northern end of the Suez canal was one of the African targets.

The high command said that there were no war raids on Germany last night or yesterday but that naval artillery downed two British bombers and a patrol boat attempting to penetrate occupied territory.

The German air force, in the air war against England, was credited with bomb hits on the industrial centers of Whitby and Sunderland.

In a continuation of the air war in the west, German planes were reported to have heavily damaged a foundry at Whitby on the northeast coast of England in a daring, low altitude raid yesterday.

The cross channel warfare, the Germans declared, cost the British 60 planes in the 24 hours ending last night.

The German radio, reflecting irritation over British raids on the reich, promised full retaliation "when the German air force is able to throw its entire strength against the British isle."

DARLAN REGARDED FOE OF AMERICAN INTERESTS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Fears are freely expressed in official quarters that Vichy's new program of collaboration with Germany held threats to American interests and territories.

Secretary of State Hull intimated that grave concern was inspired here by the elevation of Admiral Darlan, pro-axis vice premier, to supreme command of France's armed forces.

Hull has never made any secret of his opinion of Darlan. Long ago he accused him of being partner to a collaboration "scheme" whose object was to "deliver France politically, eco-

nomically, socially and militarily to Hitler" and make France a co-belligerent in "Hitler's desperate effort to conquer Great Britain and secure control of the high seas."

Vital questions of the moment were whether the French fleet would cooperate with German aims, whether French help would be sought against Britain, and whether nazi penetration of French colonies might be expected—either in Africa or the western hemisphere.

Another unknown factor of considerable importance was the reaction of General Maxime Weygand, pro-consul for North Africa, to the new collaboration. The general several times has publicly declared he would defend the independence and integrity of the French colonies against any aggressor.

The United States has cooperated with Weygand by sending supplies to the French North African colonies, cut off from their normal supply sources by the war. Moreover, Weygand and Darlan have not always seen eye to eye.

If the state department was reticent about yesterday's developments, senators and representatives were outspoken with recommendations for vigorous counter-action.

territorial changes that do not accord with the freely expressed wishes of the peoples concerned: "Third, they respect the right of all peoples to choose the form of government under which they will live; and they wish to see sovereign rights and self government restored to those who have been forcibly deprived of them; "Fourth, they will endeavor, with due respect for their existing obligations, to further the enjoyment by all states, great or small, victor or vanquished, of access, on equal terms, to the trade and to the raw materials of the world which are needed for their economic prosperity;

"Fifth, they desire to bring about the fullest collaboration between all nations in the economic field with the object of securing, for all, improved labor standards, economic advancement and social security; "Sixth, after the final destruction of the Nazi tyranny, they hope to see established a peace which will afford to all nations the means of dwelling in safety within their own boundaries, and which will afford assurance that all the men in all the lands may live out their lives in freedom from fear and want;

"Seventh, such a peace should enable all men to traverse the high seas and oceans without hindrance; "Eighth, they believe that all of the nations of the world, for realistic as well as spiritual reasons must come to the abandonment of the use of force. Since no future peace can be maintained if land, sea or air armaments continue to be employed by nations which threaten, or may threaten, aggression outside their frontiers, they believe, pending the establishment of a wider and permanent system of general security, that the disarmament of such nations is essential. They will likewise aid and encourage all other practicable measures which will lighten for peace-loving peoples the crushing burden of armaments."

The White House statement said only that President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill "have met at sea" without indicating where the unprecedented conference occurred. It said they were accompanied by high-ranking officials, including Beaverbrook, but there was no specific mention in the announcement of Harry Hopkins, assistant administrator, whose whereabouts also has been a mystery since he flew back to London after talks in Moscow with high soviet officials.

The omission, of course, did not mean that Hopkins was not also present.

although the eight points—which they regarded as strongly reminiscent of Woodrow Wilson's famous fourteen points in the first world war—dealt mainly with general phrases, the meeting was marked by adoption of a "down to brass tacks" attitude in dealing with the Japanese.

It is quite probable, according to these informants, that the two leaders agreed on:

1. The precise moment when the British and American governments would discard passive resistance for action against Japan.

2. Mutual use of British and American bases in the south Pacific.

3. A request to the soviet union to open a northern front with a Siberian red army of 1,000,000 men if war should start in the south Pacific.

Japanese sources admitted ruefully that "all these are possibilities, not necessarily probabilities."

Nothing New Said

Spanish diplomatic sources in London, who probably are closer to the axis than any other diplomats here, declared that today's joint declaration "says nothing which has not already been said by the two leaders separately."

This was admitted by informed British sources, who nevertheless made the important addition that "the very fact that only this much of the discussions was dis-

Campaign Outlined

Mr. Hoyt, who outlined the program for defense bond sales in Oregon, declared that the campaign to stimulate sale of the federal securities is independent of any other movement and declared that widespread sales of bonds and stamps will overcome the serious threat of inflation.

Britain Bans Exports to Japan, Cancels Licenses

LONDON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Britain today banned all exports to Japan except under license and revoked all outstanding licenses for that destination.

The order was announced by the board of trade. It affects Korea, Manchukuo, Formosa and the Kwantung leased territory as well as Japan proper.
