Red Cross Instructor Stresses Value of First Aid

Every injury reflects upon a community, Dr. Frank E. Hull, Red Cross first aid instructor from San Francisco who will close another instructor's class here tonight, said today.

"Twenty-six persons, who have had the standard and advanced courses, have completed the instructor's course during Dr. Hull's visit.

"Were a catastrophe to occur in Roseburg there would be no dearth of trained first aiders," Dr. Hull declared. "In such an event doctors are not enough, for they cannot be everywhere. The first aider would be the first line of defense. The American Red Cross is trying to stop accidents, and all of them must be disciples to prevent accidents."

Oregon Prune Harvest Needs More Workers

The Oregon employment service so far has listed only about one-fourth enough orchard workers to meet requests of orchardists for help in the prune harvest, according to Frank Chase, manager of the local office. Numerous appeals for help in securing individuals and families to work in the prune harvest have been received by the employment service, Mr. Chase states, but few workers so far have made applications for jobs.

Some of the orchards in which help is needed have a very large crop this year, while others have a spotted crop. Pickers are able to make better wages where the crop is large and those who register first for work will be given their choice of orchards, Mr. Chase states.

Lightning Destroys Clothesline Near Riddle

RIDDLE, Ore., Aug. 15.—During a recent electric storm, C. F. (Nen) Blundell, who resides on a farm on Shoestring creek, three miles from Riddle, heard a loud clap of thunder and saw a large cloud of blue smoke arising from his home. Believing that lightning had struck and fired the house, he rushed toward the building, but found no damage.

Investigation revealed that lightning had struck a clothesline running from the house to a tree. The current, however, had gone down the tree, scorching the leaves and a grapevine. The wire clothesline had completely disappeared, except for a short stub at the tree. Clothespins and props were on the ground and scorched.

County Grants Gravel Right for Airport Job

The WPA today was granted authority by the Douglas county court to take gravel from the Wright bar for use in surfacing the runway now being graded at the Roseburg airport. The bar is located in the South Umpqua river a short distance upstream from The Forks and is reached

by the road through the Curry estate. It is anticipated that more than 20,000 yards of gravel will be taken from the bar for surfacing purposes, according to Jack Dawson, WPA superintendent.
