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The Defense Bond Campaign

WHEN busy men, men who have constant demands upon their time for big things important to their own business and to their personal fortunes, leave their offices and spend a week or ten days touring the state in the interest of the sale of government defense bonds it means the job of providing money for defense is big and important. What these men are doing means more than that. True patriotism means personal sacrifice. They have set a great example.

Palmer Hoyt is publisher of the Portland Oregonian. Ted Gamble is concerned with large theatre interests. Ray Conway is manager of the state automobile association. Bob Farrell is an attorney and, as everybody knows the only thing a lawyer has to sell is his personal time. Those men do not receive a cent for their efforts. They get no personal reward of any shape or form. And yet, when they are asked to take charge of this campaign they did it willingly and have worked at the job night and day since.

Our country is in the midst of a war emergency. Few people any longer doubt that we shall ultimately become involved in shooting war. Vast, unimaginable sums of money are required to finance necessary preparations. Taxation will provide some of this cash but most of it will be paid off in the future with ready money obtained by the sale of government securities, the defense savings bonds.

The treasury department has wisely adopted a policy of distributing the participation in this financing over the entire population as nearly as it will be possible to do so. Small denominations have been created. The various errors and abuses that were noted following the first world war bond sale have been eliminated. The savings stamp sale plan has been worked out so that savings stamps will be available at retail stores, filling stations and anywhere that money of any size changes hands. Payroll deduction plans are in use now by nearly all of the great industrial concerns. Smaller businesses are, at the request of employees, making payroll deductions and bond purchases for members of their organizations. The defense bonds, by the way, are in units divisible by 75. Hence a deduction of 75 cents, or any multiple thereof—per week or per month can be accumulated by deductions from payroll checks and people who have such regular incomes can acquire these bonds, representing a real savings account, on the installment plan.

There are several important values to this type of government financing. Perhaps the greatest of the basic benefits are two. (1) The payroll deduction plan and thrift stamp purchase of bonds encourages thrift and savings and will provide countless personal cash reserves—money put away for a time when things are not booming with defense contracts. (2) Everyone who buys a bond buys a cash personal interest in America.

There is to be no high pressure selling—no pep drive for the distribution of defense savings bonds. It is to be a long time campaign with emphasis placed upon education about the bonds and the various purchase plans.

There will be no community quotas, no teams and none of the semi-hysterical demand pressure that marked the drives of the other war.

We shall hear a great deal more about defense bonds as time goes on. The ultimate success—the aim of the campaign will be reached when every person in the United States owns or is buying at least one government defense savings bond.

the person of Admiral Darlan, chief exponent of French collaboration with Germany.

Look next for France to turn over Northern Africa (including Dakar) to Germany, as she turned Indo-China over to Japan.

Wishful thinkers hope Weygand will stand in the way of such a transaction. It seems improbable.

ON the home front, installment buying is to be curbed. The announced purpose is to reduce buying of many things that otherwise would be conserved for defense production, and to counteract inflationary tendencies that arise when demand for certain goods is greater than the supply.

Automobiles, washing machines, refrigerators, ironers, vacuum cleaners and many similar items are to be included.

THE curb is to be applied by requiring down payments where now there are none, by requiring larger installment payments and reducing the time the contract may run.

Cash buyers will not be affected. In peace, people are urged to buy everything they can pay for. In war they are urged to get along with as little as they can. That is the difference between peace and war.

FROM Stockholm (Sweden) comes the report that the Russians on the Finnish front are using shells loaded with gasoline that burst 200 feet from the ground and set fire to the forests. This is followed by a heavy barrage to prevent the Finns from putting out the fires.

It is part of the Russian "scorched earth" policy.

FROM now until winter, look for the tempo of the war to be speeded up day by day. When winter comes, look for the war to move south.

Elk Herd Sighted In Lower Levels Of Tye District

A herd of 25 elk, mostly cows and calves, was observed Thursday by Marvin Holland, technical assistant to the supervising warden of the Douglas Forest Protective association. Holland was on an inspection trip in the Old Blue Lookout area west of the Ernest Short ranch on Wolf creek in the Tye district.

For the information of hunters who will take advantage of the opening of the elk season in western Douglas and Coos counties, starting Aug. 31, Mr. Holland reports that the animals now are congregated in creek bottoms and on the low levels. No fresh sign was found on the high ridges.

No decision so far has been reached. Mr. Holland reports, regarding what sections of the coast range area will be closed to entry by hunters, as weather conditions will determine whether the Tyea burn and other sections will be closed. In the event rains remove the fire hazard it is planned, it is stated, to open all of the section to at least entry by permit. On the other hand, unfavorable weather conditions may result in extended closure. Final decision will be reserved. It was stated until nearer the opening of the elk season.

Christian Science Committee Aids In War Relief

One war relief activity which has been little publicized is the Christian Science War Relief committee, with main offices at 237 Huntington avenue, Boston, Mass. Two thousand nine hundred and ninety nine cases—half a million garments—valued at \$489,368.23, in the ninth month of the committee's existence, is its record to date.

Only new garments or those comparable to new are accepted by the committee. These are furnished almost entirely by members of the Christian Science organization. They are shipped to a central Christian Science committee, in London, where they are allocated to different almoners in England and Scotland. The work is in the hands of members of the Christian Science denomination until the garments are distributed. They are gladly given to any person in need, regardless of denomination.

It is the purpose of the committee in the United States to keep its depots in England supplied with an adequate amount of clothing and blankets for emergencies; so, the London committee is becoming known as a storehouse from which emergencies can be met.

The main depot for shipping to England is located in Boston, but shipments are also made from New York City, Los Angeles and Portland, Oregon, where the shipping depot is located at 622 Southwest Columbia street, and the workshop at 1237 American Bank building, where used material may also be sent.

Q. Can I redeem my Treasury Tax Savings Notes for cash?

A. Yes. Series A notes can, at the option of the owner, be redeemed at the price you paid for them at any time without advance notice. Series B notes can be redeemed at the price you paid for them any time after 60 days from the time of issue, upon 30 days' notice.

Q. Where can I redeem them?

A. At the Federal Reserve Bank that issued them, in accordance with instructions on the back of each note.

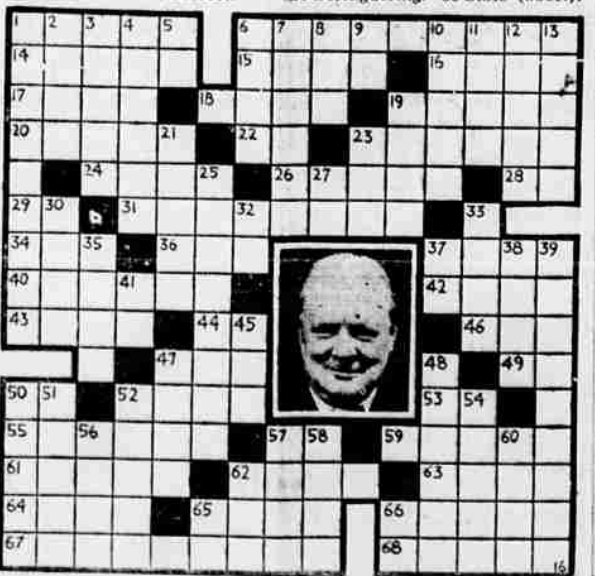

When the sect called Christians first began to get busy in the Roman empire it was said of some of the adherents when they arrived at a typical town, "They that turn the world upside down have come hither also." The Christians were known for their power to disturb. The fact is, however, that the root idea of Christianity is automatically, inevitably and everlastingly a source of disturbance. The reason of this is that social conditions which the people feel to be permanent are almost always organized upon the idea that some men are better than others, that some are born to be beasts of burden and others to be drivers. But the founder of Christianity had a most subversive idea, and with it he inoculated his followers. In those cases where the idea took, true followers were produced. Where it did not take the results were spurious. They were not real Christians though they claimed the name. Amen.

Log Haulers Warned by State Road Commission

PORTLAND, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The state highway commission yesterday warned that log haulers who overload their trucks would be prosecuted.

"Weightmasters" have been appointed in various sections and all haulers must weigh their loads in transit. The law limits vehicles to 54,000 pounds for a single-axle truck-tractor and tandem-axle trailer. The law also grants a "tolerance" of 10 per cent on the total load and 1000 pounds on the axle.

The commission decided that where a weightmaster finds a truck overloaded, he is to give the violator an opportunity to surrender his P. U. C. license plates for five calendar days for the first offense, 10 for the second and 15 for the third in any 12-month period. Should the hauler refuse to surrender plates, the public utilities commissioner will be asked to cancel his permit. Should the permit cover more than one truck the cancellation will put all the trucks out of service.
