

Rationed Gasoline For East Impends

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—At the height of the vacation season, motorists of the eastern seaboard today faced the possibility of gasoline rationing within three weeks.

Secretary of the Interior Ickes told newsmen flatly that it "wouldn't be safe" to say no rationing would be ordered.

"More rigid" measures for oil conservation in the east were imminent, he said, asserting "there hasn't been any response at all encouraging" to his pleas for voluntary cooperation by motorists.

The prospective shortage of motor fuel in the east was attributed to transportation difficulties, arising from the transfer of numerous American tankers to Britain.

Some sources here expected Ickes to propose rationing of gasoline to filling stations rather than issuance of ration cards to motorists. They did not indicate how the service stations would allot their supplies to purchasers.

Slide at Alaskan Air Base Kills 6

SITKA, Alaska, Aug. 15.—(AP)—A roaring 35-foot wall of rock, loosed by a premature explosion, was charged today with the deaths of six workmen at a quarry for the U. S. naval base on Japonski Island in Sitka harbor.

A seventh man, H. W. Haga-

dorn of Tacoma, Wash., was rescued after he lay helpless for five hours under a mass of rocks with one leg draped over a box of dynamite. Another worker, Vince Cowan, worked under the rock mass for five hours to rescue Hagadorn, who suffered only slight head injuries and bruises.

The slide occurred yesterday at noon. Three bodies had been recovered late last night. They were of Ralph J. McClure, Seattle; Commodore Dewey Strode, son of Mrs. L. A. Strode of Camas, Wash.; Ralph Carlson, son of Mrs. E. Folk, Kingston, Idaho.

The other victims listed as dead were: E. A. Burkle, C. R. Best and E. N. Rosser, the latter believed to be of Seattle.

All were employees of the Siens-Drake Construction company, builder of the many million dollar base.

Other reports were that eight other men were caught in the slide but escaped after a jackhammer struck a hidden dynamite charge.

The island on which the air base and quarry are situated is about 200 yards offshore from the town of Sitka.

main in service for an additional 18 months may be released before that period is up if the army commanders decide they are sufficiently trained and the president authorizes their release.

The draft extension measure, approved finally by a senate vote of 37 to 19 yesterday, now waits Mr. Roosevelt's assured signature.

Army to Act Quickly

At the war department officials indicated that action would follow swiftly upon Mr. Roosevelt's signing of the bill. There was some speculation that the department would recommend that the president order extension for all troops now on limited duty but then would excuse on an individual basis many thousands whose services were not considered essential.

For instance, the legislation provides that within the discretion of the secretary of war men 28 years of age or older may be mustered out. One estimate was that more than 100,000 men in this age group would be permitted to return home, but that all those who are in skilled positions or on duty at overseas posts such as Hawaii or Iceland would be kept in uniform.

Generally such action, it was said, would be in line with the high command's policy of lowering the age level of army personnel but at the same time maintaining at the highest possible strength the garrisons of strategic outposts.

Depends on Developments

As presently constituted the army consists of 1,545,400 officers and men of whom 517,000 are regulars and 1,028,400 selectees, guardsmen and reservists.

Military authorities emphasized that plans for holding the men in service would not be rigid and might be changed from time to time as the needs of defense were altered by the course of international developments.

For instance, a grave turn for the worse might bring a cessation of any releases from service whatever.

Legislation to lower the maximum draft age from 35 to 28 also awaits signing and unless Mr. Roosevelt signs or vetoes it by next Monday it will become law without his signature.

British-American camp."

Domei said these observers considered that the British-American declaration, which did not mention Japan, was issued to estrange Japan and small European nations from Germany.

Although the eight-point declaration was vague and high-sounding, it was a "very wise and cunning move on the part of the two powers to enable them to cope with any situation," the observers were quoted as saying.

"The true import, say these observers, lies in the various measures secreted behind the eight-point declaration," Domei reported.

Authoritative sources, commenting on the Roosevelt-Churchill statement, said it:

1. Amounts to the extraction of a British pledge to the United States that Great Britain will not conclude a unilateral peace with Germany.

2. Underwriters alleged British-American post-war aims of

Anglo-Saxon world domination; 3. Demonstrates the British-American failure to grasp the real causes underlying the European war.

Belated reports on the conference disclosed that Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Churchill talked for several days on both the U. S. cruiser Augusta and H. M. S. Prince of Wales, one of Britain's newest battleships.

Axis Contemptuous

Germany's first reaction was outwardly scornful. Sources close to the foreign office declared Roosevelt and Churchill had indicated clearly their "desires for omnipotence" and that the reich was ready to shatter the "Anglo-Saxon dream of world empire" by force of arms.

Realization of the program enunciated by the two statesmen would mean "the end of freedom for all," these sources said.

In Rome, fascist circles also adopted a contemptuous attitude, saying they did not see how the declaration would disturb the efforts of the axis powers.

Other Nations Pleased

Though no reaction was available immediately from Moscow, Russian circles in London indicated they were well pleased. Netherlands government circles in London also displayed satisfaction.

Mexico's reaction, swiftly voiced by her foreign minister, was one of complete approval. Words of approbation also came from government officials in Canada and New Zealand.

In India, the question was raised whether what some called the "new charter of liberty" would be translated into action as far as she is concerned.

Bulgarian newspapers printed the full text with the observation that it contained some commendable principles but, like President Wilson's famous 14 points, probably never would be put into effect. It will "find a unanimous response the world over," one newspaper declared.

Encouragement Found

The Lausanne Tribune said the leaders "expect a strategic comeback as in 1918" since they formulated a program "which complete victory alone will permit imposing on the axis."

In Argentina, Buenos Aires newspapers applauded the declaration enthusiastically. Said El Mundo, it "should receive the warmest adherence from all men of good will. All governments and peoples of America trust many benefits will come from the two great men who spoke in behalf of two great nations."

"To La Nacion it meant that 'oppressed peoples of Europe and Asia will find an encouraging road . . . the oppressors know now that the peace terms are: Turn back the booty and disarm. . . ."

Choice Up to Japan

Two points attracted special attention in air-besieged Chungking, the capital of invaded China. They were, disarmament of the axis powers and post-war restoration of self-government to peoples forcibly deprived of it.

The United States was regarded generally as having stepped closer to active belligerency and some Chinese circles said it was up to Japan now to choose between going wholly with the axis or seeking an understanding with Chungking, Washington and London.

The Spanish press accompanied front-page reports of the meeting with sarcastic comment. London was disappointed and "the Yankee people uncon-

vinced," said newspaper headlines.

"Words, only words—lyrical and superficial," was the judgment of the newspaper ABC.

Britain Seeks More Aid

The importance of American arms production in the Roosevelt-Churchill discussions was evidenced by the arrival today in Washington of Lord Beaverbrook, Britain's dynamic minister of supply, who participated in the conferences.

Beaverbrook announced that he was seeking more of everything—more tanks, more planes (particularly bombers), more food, more supplies of all kinds.

He threw cold water on theorizing that Britain was counting on winning the war from the air.

"Bombing from the air did not beat us," he said vehemently.

This remark was interpreted as implying that Britain intended sooner or later to invade continental Europe in an attempt to roll back the Nazi armies.

Beaverbrook's other comments, however, did not convey the impression that such a military venture was close at hand, for he stressed, among other things, that "we haven't got enough tanks" and "tanks in quantity are considered indispensable for such an operation."

might be cut off by German troops advancing toward the industrial center of Dnepropetrovsk, at the great bend of the Dnieper river.

Battles Rage All Night

A red army war bulletin, silent on the bloody struggle in the Ukraine, mentioned only that fierce all-night fighting raged in the sectors of Kakhovsk, 75 miles north of Leningrad; Staraya Russia, about 140 miles south of Leningrad, and in Estonia, southwest of the old-time capital of the czars.

Italian military dispatches said fascist troops entering the fight on the southern front had made their first contact with the Russians, encountering furious resistance.

The Germans claimed that all crossings of the Dnieper river for several hundred miles south of Kiev were already in Nazi hands, but there was no detailed report of any crossing.

British observers estimated that the area reported overrun by German, Hungarian, Rumanian and Italian troops contained about 50 per cent of the Ukraine's heavy industries.

Adolf Hitler's high command reiterated yesterday's claims of big gains in the Ukraine and de-
