

## Quick Aid to Soviet Seen In 3-Power Conference

plan. He told the United States and British ambassadors in Moscow today that he is ready to "take all necessary steps" for the conference.

### Possible Envoys Named

Lord Beaverbrook, minister of supply (for Britain) and elder Harry Hopkins, lend-lease administrator, or W. Averell Harriman, lend-lease expediter (for the United States) were groomed as the "high representatives" Roosevelt and Churchill proposed to send to Moscow.

High ranking army and air force officers and production specialists also may be selected, providing the equivalent of an American military mission, to collaborate with the British military mission already at work in the Russian capital.

The Roosevelt-Churchill proposal to convene the three-power meeting in Moscow was interpreted as reflecting their confidence that the red army would continue to hold out against the terrific axis attack until large-scale deliveries of urgently needed supplies could be made by the United States and Great Britain.

The proposal also raised the question whether Soviet Russia would be granted lend-lease facilities on the same terms extended to embattled Britain.

Soviet purchases have been on a cash basis.

### BRITISH TROOPS MAY BE SENT TO RUSSIA

LONDON, Aug. 16. (AP)—The request by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill for a three-power conference with Russia was taken here today as a sign that the United States and Britain consider Russia far from beaten.

Although the Soviet army was reported retreating before a fierce German offensive in the Ukraine, war commentators emphasized that the message to Premier Joseph Stalin referred to "consideration of a long-term policy," apparently indicating expectation that the war would last a long time.

At the same time the fact that the two nations pledged Russia "the very maximum of supplies" brought a new crop of rumors that Britain would land troops in the cold northern wastes of Russia to keep open the important Arctic supply line.

### Two Routes Obvious

Supplies from Britain and America could enter Russia by two obvious routes, going through the Arctic ports of Murmansk and Archangel or across the Pacific to Vladivostok. If Japan entered the war against Russia one of these supply lines would be gone, while a big German-Finnish advance in the north would cut the second.

For this reason, informed sources said, Russia, the United States and Britain would be anxious to consolidate the northern front and make at least one supply line safe.

One other route was possible. Supplies could be taken through the Persian Gulf port of Basra, up through Iraq and across Iran (Persia) or Turkey to the Caucasus, provided those countries would consent.

now that the debate was ended and the policy governing service extension settled this situation would eventually right itself.

### Danger Points Cited

The secretary of war declared there were many points at which German or Japanese forces—which he described as composed of veteran troops of professional efficiency—might attack the United States. In this connection he mentioned bases in both the Atlantic and Pacific and continued: "The present attack of Germany on Russia, who has always been a peaceful neighbor of ours in the Pacific, now brings out into sharp prominence the importance of (Alaskan and Aleutian island) outposts. Japanese newspapers are already beginning to tell us the trouble we may expect to have in Alaska if Germany conquers Russia."

But the "most dangerous avenue of attack," Stimson declared, is through South or Central America, and he made it clear that in his opinion this danger would be increased extremely if the Nazis should move into Dakar, French West African port opposite Brazil, as a result of Vichy's policy of collaborating with Germany.

"If, by combining an air attack with a fifth column revolution," he said, "and axis power should succeed in making a lodgment upon the coast of South America, we should have a real task in-

deed; for it would not be difficult for an enemy lodged there to get within easy bombing distance of the Panama canal."

### Defense Sole Purpose

Apparently in reply to arguments advanced during the service extension debate that the government was planning to use troops abroad Stimson told the army that "we have not been seeking any wild adventures in foreign wars; we have not been planning any expeditionary force for the benefit of other nations."

The sole purpose of the armament program, he continued, is defensive. Already, he said, American troops stand guard from Iceland to British Guiana and from Alaska to Panama and a successful attack upon any of the outposts they garrison "would make necessary a major military effort to drive off" the enemy.

But holding even greater danger of invasion than the capture of outposts, he declared, would be a German defeat of Britain which he said would mean naval superiority for the axis powers. "Then indeed we would be face to face with a danger which even our isolationists would recognize as the danger of invasion," he said.

800 Russians were slain and 200 captured.

### Rival Air Raids Score

The Germans said their dive bombers had silenced seven of Odessa's anti-aircraft guns and were pounding at roads and railroads choked with Russian troops in a big "encirclement zone" embracing most of the Ukraine west of the Bug river.

But the Russians, illustrating that they, too, have bombers, said they heavily raided Berlin and the German Baltic port of Stettin last night, setting off great explosions and fires. The Germans acknowledged raids by a "limited number" of Russian bombers.

In the Smolensk central sector where fighting previously was heaviest, the Germans were pictured as digging in, with little intention of an immediate push. The Moscow war bulletin told of increased Nazi parachute attacks in the Ukraine, where the Russians said their lines had stiffened after being forced back between Kiev and Odessa.

### Turkey Settles One Row

After a heated controversy involving British and Italian interpretations of treaties governing the Dardanelles, the Turks today permitted an Italian naval tanker to proceed to Rumania for oil—but under the condition that hereafter there will be no exceptions to the rules.

It was the second time Turkey had interpreted the straits treaty regulations to permit the tanker to make a round trip to Rumania for oil badly needed by Italy.

High foreign diplomatic officials in Ankara said Turkey was considering a German request to transport food by rail through this country to the Russian border after refusing Berlin transit of war materials.

The reported German request apparently was made in the expectation that Nazi troops would succeed in driving through the Ukraine to the Russian-Turkey border in the Caucasus.

It has been surmised here for many weeks that the Germans were seeking permission to use Turkish transportation facilities, not only to supply Nazi forces in Russia, but to guarantee provi-

sions for a possible move against Iran (Persia).

### Toll at Sea Increased.

British bombers apparently were grounded overnight by bad weather, although a few German planes dropped bombs in north-east England, East Anglia and Scotland.

RAF fighters made another sweep over northern France today.

The air war also continued in the Mediterranean, Italy announcing that the British took a heavy toll of life in night raids on Catania, Sicily, and that Italian steamers near Tripoli also were attacked.

The Germans said they bombed British ships in Tobruk harbor, Libya, and that off the British Isles three British merchant vessels were sunk by bombers.

Two axis merchantmen and a destroyer guarding a convoy headed for the main German-Italian supply base in Libya, Tripoli, probably were sunk in a fleet air arm attack Thursday night, the RAF middle east headquarters at Cairo reported today.

It said all three ships were hit by air-launched torpedoes in that attack and four others were hit by RAF bombers in another assault in the central Mediterranean between Tripoli and the advanced Libyan base at Benghazi yesterday.

(Two more axis merchant ships were reported by the Netherlands admiralty in London as sunk by Dutch submarines serving with the British fleet in the Mediterranean.)

sion notified President Roosevelt yesterday that a ceremony scheduled in connection with Texas' oil-for-Britain day had been cancelled because "efforts have been made by certain companies to stifle this program."

The ceremony, for the presentation of warrants representing the donated oil, was scheduled for Monday. Plans went ahead to allow all oil companies so desiring to voluntarily produce next Sunday, ordinarily a shut-down day, oil to be given to Britain.

The commissioners asserted that some companies desired to "fatten their coffers with the taxpayers' money" through the lend-lease and other vital defense contracts. Their telegram to President Roosevelt pointed out: "This is not to rebuke those who hold back, but simply to lift them into the light of day so that those patriotic men and women who have contributed their oil to Great Britain and those who are paying the bill with tax dollars for defense of life, freedom and property will know the true facts."

Some producing companies have explained they could not join in the oil donation because of technical difficulties.

Jack W. Frazier of Houston, an independent operator, said independent operators "with assignments of production to banks and supply houses . . . would like to help but could not. In the case of companies, he said they "can not give away what belongs to stockholders."

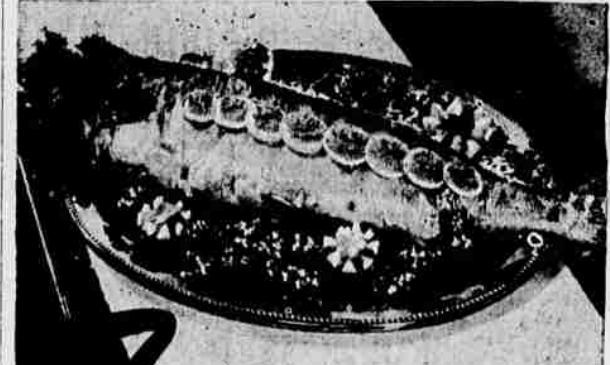
