McNutt Pleads For Work for Negroes

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 19.—(AP)—A plea for wider use of the negro in defense work came from Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt as leaders of labor and industry gathered today to discuss with him the problem of job dislocation caused by the priorities system and stopping of silk imports from Japan. "Let racial prejudice fly out of the window in tackling the job of building America's defense," declared McNutt in an interview. "There has been a vicious circle so far as the negro worker is concerned."

Pointing out 15 per cent of all basic defense contracts have been allotted Philadelphia concerns, McNutt predicted industry here would need 150,000 more skilled workers within the next few months and that at least 50,000 would be imported into the area to meet the need. Calling for hiring of negroes, he declared:

"Employers contended negroes had neither the training nor experience for industrial work. Yet, without getting into it, there was no chance for them to get training or experience. We broke this circle by training the negro vocationally and now there are many of them ready for jobs. But, despite shortages of skilled workers, they aren't getting the jobs."

Rosenman to Study Mess in Defense Agencies

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has commissioned Judge Samuel I. Rosenman of the New York state supreme court to make a study of differences between the office of production management and the office of price administration and civilian supply.

OPM and POACS have not seen eye to eye on some policy matters, such as a proposed curtailment of automobile production to make room for expanded defense output by motor car plants.

One plan reported under consideration was creation of a policy board. It was said to have the backing both of Rosenman and the budget bureau.

One high-placed official, calling the automobile controversy "just a small sample of what has been going on," described the alleged conflicts within various defense agencies as a "mess."
