Aluminum Output Stalemate Rapped By Rep. Pierce

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The aluminum manufacturing program has been held back by the government's decision to locate aluminum factories at a distance from Bonneville dam, Rep. Pierce (D., Ore.) has charged.

"The criminal delay in producing aluminum is even worse than the dollars wasted," he told the house.

The government proposed to construct plants at Tacoma, Spokane and about 20 miles from Portland. Pierce said that aluminum would cost \$6 more a ton than if the plants were situated near the power-generating plant.

No definite decision on the sites has been made, although it is 90 days since the construction program was announced, he added, declaring the delay equivalent to 100,000,000 pounds of aluminum.

"These delays in one plant alone amount to 133 largest bombers and over 800 average fighting planes a month. If the OPM, FPC, RFC and other alphabetical agencies were actually interested in aluminum production and the resulting air-

plane manufacture, they would have located the aluminum plants promptly and most advantageously close to the bus bar." Pierce said in extension of remarks.

Flood Control Bill Signed by F. D. R.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed today a bill authorizing a \$275,000,000 flood control program and made it clear that all projects would be held up which are not important to national defense.

"The measure merely authorizes construction of scores of projects without appropriating funds for them."

"In approving this bill," Mr. Roosevelt said in a statement, "I wish to make it clear that during the present emergency I do not intend to submit estimates of appropriation or approve allocations of funds for any project which does not have important value in the national defense."

White house officials said that the president's action in signing the legislation was part of his declared policy of creating a backlog of projects which may be undertaken after the current emergency ends. They could be used at that time to take up employment slack caused by the lessening of the pace of defense production.

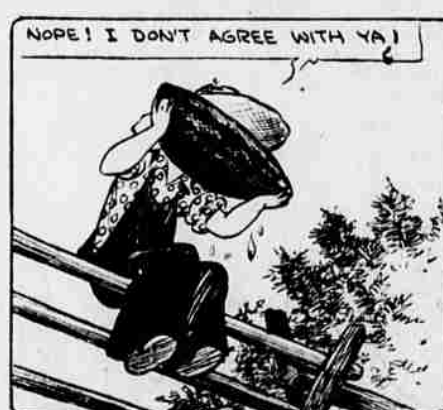
