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ilar to the route which President Roosevelt disclosed Monday would be set up in west Africa and thence to the Mediterranean area. This line also would be utilized, it was said, to take planes through the near east to Russia.

There seemed little disposition among administration supporters, meanwhile, to link the projected Hopkins trip to Moscow with the possible extension of lease-lend credits to the soviet.

More Punch Promised

President Roosevelt asserted yesterday the war would continue through 1943, if necessary, and that Britain and the United States would make a survey of needs and production through that year.

That was a subject he had up, Mr. Roosevelt told a press conference, at a meeting with Lord Beaverbrook, British supply minister.

Mr. Roosevelt told reporters he thought his sea conference with Winston Churchill would result in what a newsman called more punch in helping the democracies of the world.

"Did the prime minister seem confident that Britain could win without our help," the chief executive was asked.

Mr. Roosevelt said he did not think that kind of a question was useful. It was what he termed too headline, without having sufficient substance.

Lincoln Parrel Drawn

"Then after explaining off the record why he could not give a specific answer to the inquiry, he read a portion of a biography of Abraham Lincoln which told how this civil war president in 1862, a year after that conflict started, said the nation would get out of its fix by strategy. Lincoln said the people had no idea war was to be carried on through hard, tough fighting in which somebody would be hurt.

"If you were going to write a lead on that," a reporter inquired, "how would you do it?"

Authorizing a direct quotation, Mr. Roosevelt replied:

"I would say, 'president quotes Lincoln and draws parallel.'" To a question whether the parallel was to the situation in this country, Mr. Roosevelt agreed that it was.

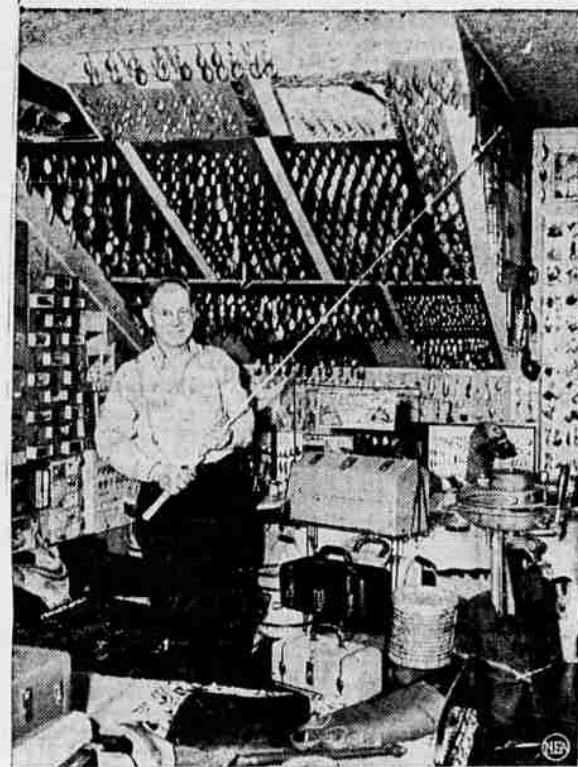
cooperation with the board of directors and president.

A committee composed of E. S. McClain, H. O. Pargeter and L. E. McClintock has been named by President L. A. Rhoden to assist in the selection of division heads. This committee, working with the president, will select the persons to head each of the seven divisions. The division heads then will join the committee in the selec-

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tion of chairmen for the various sub-departments.

The board of directors will, under this program, be left free for the work of finance and surveys. They will conduct studies of community needs, and will then place the detail work in the respective departments.

The seven departments will include membership, retail trade, industrial, civic affairs, transportation, publicity and tourists-conventions.

Functions Outlined

Under the membership department will be committees on finance rating, membership campaigns, delinquencies. The committees under the retail trade division will include good will, annual events—spring opening, fall opening and Christmas decorations and program—and special events.

There will be five committees in the industrial division covering planning, timber, minerals, miscellaneous factories and agriculture. The agriculture committee will be further divided into marketing, promotion, fairs and exhibits.

The civic affairs division will have committees on public spending, taxation and projects.

The transportation division, with five committees, will deal with freight rates, passenger travel, schedules, highways and aviation.

The publicity division will have committees on publications and news.

Tourist accommodations and conventions committees will make up the seventh division.

The work of selecting the heads of divisions and committees already is well under way and it is expected that the completed organization will be ready for full operation in the near future.

The plan, it is stated, has the advantage of employing the services of a number of persons, together with a wider distribution of responsibility, yet with a centralized supervision over the entire procedure.

British bombers struck again overnight into northern Germany. Some damage was done by German night raiders over British coastal sections.

Relations between Britain and France developed a new strain as Vichy heard that two British warships had steamed into the blockaded port of Jibuti, French Somaliland, after a British dispatch boat shelled a French ship outside the harbor.

The Jibuti radio, source of this report, gave no further details of the action, but declared that the blockade was having a disastrous effect on the entire colony.

While two other German and German-Finnish columns drove on Leningrad from the west and north, the soviet high command's communique said the fiercest battle raged about Novgorod, an ancient walled town above Lake Ilmen.

The Russians said the Novgorod province terrain was favorable for a determined stand, since it is half-covered with forest and dotted with about 1,200 lakes. The town itself, standing high on a hill over the Volkov river, is surrounded by swamps and lowlands.

but AFL officers refused to hear it.

"We're not ready to listen to anything like that," one union official declared.

A spokesman for the striking union said the walkout was intended to enforce the union's demand for recognition as sole bargaining agent for the operators. Jeffries retorted that this was in effect a demand for a closed shop, and that "we can't grant that."

The mayor said he was "dumbfounded" at the action of unionists who established a 4 a. m. strike deadline when they voted the walkout shortly after midnight. State labor laws require a five-day "cooling off period" after notice of intent to strike, and a 30-day wait in disputes involving public utilities.
