Sprague Asks Knox To Remove Ban On West Shipyards

SALEM, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Governor Sprague appealed to Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox yesterday to reconsider his decision prohibiting west coast shipyards from converting merchant ships into naval and military auxiliary craft.

Knox made the decision on grounds that labor costs were higher than those in east coast yards.

After pointing out in a letter to Knox that wage scales in Portland yards have been in effect for several years, the governor wrote that "the workers in the yards feel it would be unfair to ask them to take lower wages."

"There has been no labor trouble in Portland in ship construction work, as has afflicted other districts. This speaks well for the loyal attitude of the workers here."

"Naturally, I am anxious that just as much work as possible comes to my state. We have the facilities and workmen to carry on shipbuilding and conversion work on a considerable scale."

"Will it be possible for you to have this subject reexamined, and to have a representative of the navy meet again with Portland interests, including representatives of the workers? This might lead the way to a solution, and certainly would be a gesture that would be welcomed by the workers?"

Governor Sprague's letter was written after Earl Ingram, secretary of the Portland metal trades council, wrote the governor a complaint that the navy's policy was unfair to the Portland shipyard workers.

A most vivid story of Elijah on Mount Horeb is related in the 19th chapter of 1 Kings. This great prophet and demonstrator of the power of God had passed through a moment of deep discouragement.

"Through suggestions of violence and hate he had lost sight of spiritual power and had fled into the wilderness, where lying under a juniper tree he cried out: 'It is enough, now, O Lord, take away my life.'" But strengthened by the food given to him by the Angel of the Lord, he arose and traveled from the wilderness to the heights of Mount Horeb, and there, after the wind, the earthquake and the fire, there came to him a still small voice.

The lessons that may be learned from the Old Testament narratives are ageless and they can be applied in all periods of human experience. Elijah, after he had gained strength to arise and go from the wilderness to the heights of Horeb and when he fully realized that the turmoil and destruction were after all deceptive, for the spirit of God was not in them, then he could hear a still small voice. Jesus was forever trying to tell his followers the reality of spiritual things, "the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal." Yet we cling to the unreal. Amen.

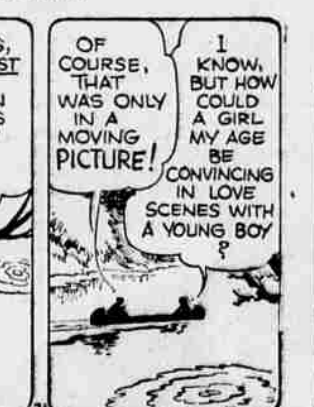
