

### Cardinals Garner Double Win, Creep Nearer Brooklyn

The pennant problem in the National league is getting to be "can the St. Louis Cardinals keep going with all their injuries?" instead of "can the Cardinals beat the Brooklyn Dodgers?"

In spite of a procession of trouble the Cardinals have kept right on coming and yesterday they swept a doubleheader from the Boston Braves 2-0 and 3-2. Ernie White, the Cards' great young left-hander, pitched a six-hit shutout in the first game for his 15th victory and Howard Pollock, 20-year-old southpaw, pitched a four-hitter for his major league debut in the nightcap.

The double triumph enabled the Cards to climb within a game and a half of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who were given a 7-6 hand-out by the Pittsburgh Pirates for Brooklyn's sixth straight win.

The Cincinnati Reds reinforced their third place position by shutting out the Phillies twice, 2-0 and 3-0. Vander Meer allowed only three hits and Riddle kept six blows scattered for his 14th triumph in the nightcap.

The Chicago Cubs cut loose with a 16-hit attack as Eaves kept eight hits spaced to beat the New York Giants 9-4.

**Bridges Blanks Yankees.**  
In the American league the New York Yankees were squeezed out 1-0 by the Detroit Tigers as Bridges pitched two-hit ball for ten innings in one of the finest performances of his long career.

The Chicago White Sox chopped another game off the Yankees' ample lead as Rigney blanked the Philadelphia Athletics 9-0 for the third shutout in two days by a Sox pitcher and Rigney's second shutout in two starts.

The collapsing Cleveland Indians dropped their 14th game in 15 decisions 6-3 to the Washington Senators in a pitching duel between Anderson and Smith which was decided in the ninth inning when the Senators scored four times to Cleveland's two.

The Boston Red Sox were beaten in both ends of a doubleheader by the St. Louis Browns, 11-9 and 4-3.

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### With Major Hoopie

### Private Utilities Blamed by Ickes For PUD Spread

SPOKANE, Aug. 20. (AP)—Harold L. Ickes is convinced that private utilities alone are to blame for the growth of government-sponsored power operations which he is determined shall be expanded to the very limit.

"There would be no public power versus private power issue in this country today if the private utilities had been satisfied with a reasonable profit. If they had not engaged in corrupting our political life," the secretary of interior said.

"If you check up on those who are trying to make the people believe the federal government has been taking advantage of you by spending hundreds of millions of dollars out here in order to make you economically free, you will probably discover a private utility man, or a little brother of a private utility man."

**Public Good Disregarded.**  
Addressing a mass meeting last night in this public-power-conscious section of the northwest, Ickes took occasion also to proclaim his belief that industrial leaders worked in league to achieve their own advantages without regard for public economy.

"Remember that every monopoly you scratch is a brother under the skin to every other monopoly," he said. "They willingly give each other help when an assault is to be made upon the 'graveyard'."

"All of us want to stabilize industrialization. We don't want any monopoly, 'beneficial' or otherwise, to have the power of economic life or death here or anywhere else. We want healthy industrial rivals."

Thus did the secretary explain his department's refusal to grant the aluminum company of America an additional 60,000-kilowatt block of power from Bonneville dam to augment the 162,500 kilowatts it had previously been allotted by that government project. The power instead was assigned to the Reynolds Metals company to operate a competing plant.

Both here and in Grand Coulee scene of another giant power-irrigation development which he inspected earlier in the day, Ickes pledged his complete efforts toward helping enlarge public control of power.

**Public Utilities to Be Bought.**  
"I regard it as inevitable," he told the mass meeting, "that this far northwest will, in due course and by an orderly procedure, under which a just and fair price will be paid for existing private utilities, come to be a great self-contained public power empire with industry balancing agriculture, and with agriculture finding a market locally for its products, while the great supporting industries of mining, lumbering, shipbuilding and fishing make their considerable respective contributions to the public welfare."

### Gasoline Scarcity Nears Peril Stage

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21. (AP)—Reporting that the long-predicted oil shortage in the east finally had arrived, Ralph K. Davies, deputy petroleum coordinator, said yesterday stocks of gasoline in the east had dropped to a reserve supply sufficient only for approximately ten days.

Davies spoke of a "perilous situation," re-emphasizing the warning from the office of price control and civilian supply that more drastic measures might be necessary beyond the limited gasoline rationing now in effect. Stocks of gasoline on the east coast dropped 893,000 barrels last week, as diversion of American tankers to Great Britain began to make itself really felt, the

deputy coordinator reported. Replying to those he called "near-sighted prophets" who had circulated reports that warnings of an impending shortage were "phony," Davies gave a detailed report on oil supplies on the Atlantic seaboard, and added:

"This is why we must conserve gasoline stocks now to avoid a drastic shortage this winter when our tankers must be used to haul fuel oils unless our people are to be left to freeze and our defense industry shut down for lack of power."

"This is the beginning of the sharp and serious drop in supplies that we forecast," Davies declared. "Figures which have become available today show that reports that stocks on the east coast are in firm and safe condition are myths."
