The Result of Monopoly

The city administration of Roseburg has been most patient with the Pacific Greyhound lines. For many years the company has been permitted to use the street for an entire city block as a terminal.

If the bus company happened to be a young and struggling concern and generally used the streets of cities for terminal purposes, it would be most unkind of us to voice an objection. But the bus company quite obviously is enjoying an excellent business and has been a very successful concern for many years.

But Roseburg is the only city wherein the bus company has a monopoly on through passenger traffic. It is quite obviously deliberately abusing its power as a monopoly.

During rainy weather those who board or depart from a bus in Roseburg are compelled to get wet. Most buses have a rest stop here. The passengers file out onto the sidewalk and must take whatever weather conditions they find.

Apparently the bus company never intends to remedy this condition. So long as we are willing to take it and do and say nothing about it, there probably is no binding reason why they should do anything about it from their point of view, that is, in other words it is a sort of isolated throw-back to the old monopoly days when the policy in such matters was "Let the public be damned."

But we are not utterly helpless in the matter unless our city council chooses to make us helpless. After all, the streets—even the block on Washington street between Jackson and Main streets—do belong to the city. They belong to the residents and taxpayers of Roseburg.

Unless we are greatly mistaken our city administration can prevent the use of a city block in the heart of our downtown section from being used for private business purposes. We feel mighty certain that we would be "told off" quickly if we were to place a couple of printing presses out in the street in front of our office and operate them there for a few hours each day.

Men and guns means more to Russia's defense than cities.

It is possible, as your map will show you, that Odessa might become another Tobruk. It is open to the Black sea, and might be supplied by the Russian Black sea fleet, thus becoming a threat on the flank of a further German advance.

Tobruk, on the Libyan coast, supplied by the British Mediterranean fleet, has become such an effective threat on the axis flank as to have held up the German-Italian advance on Alexandria.

(Consider this as a possibility, but don't do any wishful thinking about it.)

In London today, the belief is said to be growing that Britain and Russia are planning a decisive step shortly in Iran.

Remember there was a rumor to that effect from Ankara the other day, and these Ankara rumors have been right often enough to give them a certain dignity.

Ankara today says Germany is demanding air bases and aviation gas in Iran and is threatening to overthrow the government there if her demands are not complied with.

It is estimated there are some 3,000 German "tourists" and technicians in Iran. German agents are said to be filtering into the Iranian army.

Grabbing countries by this device is a favorite German stunt.

FOR information as to Iran's importance, consult your map. It will show you not only that Iran has OIL, which is one of the prime essentials of modern warfare, but is the natural route (by way of the Persian gulf) for bringing in British reinforcements from India—where General Wavell has been hard at work for some time.

Looking at it the other way around, Iran (Persia) is the historic route for invasion of India from the west.

It's pretty safe to look for something exciting to happen there.
