

Opening Dates Of Duck Seasons Set; Old Rules Remain

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—America's 7,500,000 licensed hunters got official assurance today of a 60-day open season on ducks this fall, along with welcome word from the fish and wildlife service that the waterfowl population had more than doubled since 1935.

The interior department's 1941 regulations for shooting migratory game birds permit northern sportsmen to take to the blinds first on October 1.

Two other broad lateral zones, stretching east-west and having the same general expectations for the advance of duck hunting weather, were assigned later opening dates. The season will start in the intermediate zone October 16, and on November 2 in the southern states.

A 60-day season and a bag limit of 10 again was set for ducks, but dove hunters saw their shooting period trimmed to a maximum of 42 days. The 15-day season for woodcock was continued.

The fish and wildlife service estimated that about 70,000,000 ducks, geese and other waterfowl would begin winging southward on their long-established flyways with the arrival of cool weather in Canada and the northern United States.

The regulations continue to bar the use of bait or live decoys, and in addition prohibit the use of cattle, horses, or mules as blinds. Hunters may use shotguns not larger than 10 gauge, and repeating and automatic guns must be plugged to take no more than three shells.

Duck and goose shooting hours remain the same—sunrise to 4 p. m.

Japan Gets Veiled British Warning On Thailand Crisis

LONDON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Any further move by Japan in the far east would be regarded by Britain as "extremely serious," authoritative quarters said today, although it is understood that London has given Thailand no specific assurances that this little nation's independence would be maintained by British arms.

"There is no doubt what the British government's feeling would be if Thailand's independence were threatened," one of these quarters said, although it was added that Britain had not been asked to guarantee this independence.

Comment had been provoked in authoritative quarters by a speech on a program broadcast by the British to Thailand from the Netherlands East Indies in which the speaker had said: "Let Thailand stand firm in maintenance of her independence. She will not stand alone."

Britain's fighting services, it was said, have taken adequate defense measures in the far east.

Concern has been expressed over Japan's intentions regarding Thailand ever since she moved into neighboring French Indo-China and was reported to be bringing pressure upon Thailand to grant her military and economic advantages.

TOKYO, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A far eastern crisis is being "feverishly wrought up by Britain," Domol asserted today on what it said was the authority of a "certain qualified observer."

"British authorities now are desperately engaged in maintaining the rights and interests of Thailand in view of the Thai geographical position as Britain's foremost outpost in southeastern Asia," the news agency declared.

"Hence Britain is instigating the Thailand people with traditional diplomatic adroitness while trying to let third powers pick British chestnuts out of the fire."

Britain was said also to be actively "working up another dispute, through either intimidation or appeasement of Thailand, thereby to direct American attention to Thailand."

PEIPING, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Reliable reports from Tientsin said today Japanese military authorities there had temporarily suspended granting permits for foreigners to travel by water to Shanghai and soon might suspend overland travel as well.

Record Bass of 33 Pounds Netted in Lower Umpqua

REEDSPORT, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The largest striped bass ever taken from the lower Umpqua river, a 33-pounder, was netted yesterday by Gus Johnson, commercial fisherman.

The fish was 46 inches long and 24 inches around the middle. Larger striped bass have been caught in Coos bay, but it is seldom they enter the Umpqua river in such large numbers as they have this year.

Oregon Youths Offered Army, Navy School Entry

The first congressional district of Oregon will have two vacant

places in 1942 at both the U. S. Naval academy, Annapolis, Maryland, and at the U. S. Military academy, West Point, New York. To determine the eligible candidates residing in the first Oregon district, Congressman Mott has requested the civil service commission to hold a preliminary qualifying examination on Saturday, October 4, 1941.

Candidates for admission to the naval academy must be no less than seventeen years of age nor more than twenty-one years of age on April 1, 1942. Candidates for the military academy are eligible for admission from the day they are seventeen until the day they become twenty-two years of age, on which latter day they are not eligible. Candidates for both academies must never have been married.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that applicants notify Congressman James W. Mott, Salem, Oregon, not later than September 15, 1941, of their desire to participate in the examination.

Oregon Turkey Growers Will Meet in Eugene

Catholic Women Oppose Mrs. Roosevelt's Plan

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The National Catholic Women's union yesterday adopted a resolution opposing a proposal by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt for compulsory governmental service for women as a "hideous example" of the rising tide of bureaucracy in government.

The resolution said the union opposed the proposal "because it is, at best, a very rash and needless social experiment, fraught with moral, social and political dangers."

The union met in joint session with the Catholic Central Verein of America. The Verein adopted a resolution expressing belief in a strong defense and adequate armed forces and warning that the nation is in danger of armed participation in the war.
