

Great Tillamook Fire to Be Radio Dramatic Theme

SALEM.—The Tillamook burn which brought devastation to 300,000 acres and destroyed enough timber to build a million homes will be re-dramatized on the air Sunday by Lynn F. Cronmiller, assistant state forester, who is traveling to Los Angeles to appear on the CBS "I Was There" radio program.

Ten minutes of the broadcast sponsored by the General Petroleum company and heard on CBS stations every Sunday evening from 9 to 9:30 o'clock, will be devoted to the Tillamook conflagration which swept through the coast country in mid August, 1933.

According to the assistant state forester, more than 3000 fire fighters were engaged in attempt to combat the \$200,000,000 fire, however, because of low humidity and high winds little progress could be made and it was only after eleven hard, long days of work that the spread of the fire was checked.

In addition to the vast forest losses the fire claimed one life, that of an Illinois CCC youth who was hit by a falling snag. Cronmiller, who directed much of the fire fighting activities during the burn, will relate his experiences direct from the CBS Hollywood studios. He will leave Salem by train Friday.

won quick support from Senators Thomas (D-Utah) and Bailey (D-N. C.), advocates of increased aid to countries fighting Germany.

Bailey told newsmen that while he held no brief for the soviet form of government, he did not think that ideological dislikes should deter this country from any material contribution it could make to hasten a German defeat.

"If it was a den of rattlesnakes opposing Hitler, I would aid and abet them," he declared. Taking much the same view, Thomas called it good business to extend the credits, if the United States were promised payment in vital raw materials, such as Russian manganese ore.

"Promissory Note" Unwanted While Danaher saw no objection to establishment of a medium of dollar exchange by which Russia could convert some of her natural resources into cash to buy war supplies here, he forecast strenuous opposition to any move to accept a "promissory note" from the soviets, which Jones had indicated might be sufficient.

This also interested Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), who quipped: "It looks like some of the money lent to Finland may soon be fighting money lent to Russia."

There was no levity, however, in the attitude of Senator Johnson (R-Calif.). "I think it would be a terrible thing," he declared.

However, the soviets declared they had fallen back in a strategic maneuver to keep the red army intact, after inflicting

bloody losses on the Germans, and said the fight was continuing in that area.

On the Ukraine front, a Moscow communique indicated that Marshal Budyenny's southwest armies still were executing a major withdrawal eastward across the Dnieper river, under phalling attack by the luftwaffe.

News on the size of Odessa, now reported isolated, was lacking. Latest German dispatches had pictured soviet troops bottled up in the black sea port as undergoing a terrific assault from Stuka dive-bombers and artillery, but there was still no claim of its surrender.

The Germans pointed out that the capture of Novgorod, 100 miles south of Leningrad, which was announced yesterday by the German high command, seriously threatened rail connection between Leningrad and Moscow.

They declared German and Finnish forces were moving steadily down on the city from the north and suggested that in order to save Leningrad from the fate of Warsaw its residents should ignore Marshal Voroshilov's appeal to fight to the last, and declare it an open city.

The soviet radio in London said today that a fleet of German transports carrying reinforcements to the Ukraine front was routed by soviet bombers in three sweeps along the Rumanian coast.

Two transports were said to have been sunk, another set afire, and other hit.

Three persons were killed and six injured in a raid on Alexandria last night, a communique from Cairo said today. The damage was slight, it was said.

CANYONVILLE, Aug. 22.—The South Douglas community fair will be held Saturday, Aug. 23, at the community hall in Canyonville, and all plans indicate a very successful event.

Excellent cooperation has been shown this year in the preliminary arrangements, which have been in the hands of division chairmen, with the cooperation of the county fair board, county agent, 4-H club leader and others.

An added feature this year will be sports events, and a softball game during the afternoon.

Organization of Convicts for U. S. Defense Proposed

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Organization of convicts into units for national defense work was proposed to the American Prison Association today by Sam A. Lewisohn, New York industrialist and member of the Prisons Industries, Inc.

He suggested that each penitentiary recruit all suitable prisoners and classify them for possible service as soldiers or skilled workers. Convicts not qualified for these services might be put on maintenance work in the prisons, taking the place of others who could then be made available for defense jobs, he said.

Recalling that prisoners in several institutions already had voiced desires to do military service or some kind of defense work, and that it is possible now for some men with criminal records to enlist in the army, Lewisohn said "society cannot close the door in the face of men who have earned the right to take their place in every other part of the social program."

"Most prisoners," he added, realize that they have an important stake in the outcome of the world crisis and will cooperate gladly. Of course there are a few prisoners who will not willingly cooperate. To them I say, quite frankly, they will be made to pull their weight in the boat or be jettisoned."

Lewisohn proposed that the prison association appoint a commission to select and develop convict recruits and to fit them into military or industrial defense.

He said the commission also could divert to the defense effort many of the 75,000 men who leave United States prisons every year.

Mayor Edward J. Jeffries, who last night described himself as "tired, hungry and mad," arranged a new series of conferences today with the AFL union which called the strike, and the CIO group which opposed the AFL demand for exclusive bargaining rights, exclusive use of bulletin boards, and exclusive checkoff privileges.

Disputes on Other Fronts. Labor unrest continued in other sections of the nation.

Gulfport, Conn., was experiencing its first strike in 302 years. Eighty employees of the New Haven Clock company walked out, following the lead of 1,400 employees of the firm at New Haven.

The defense mediation board yesterday urged that production be resumed at the Bessemer, Ala., plant of the Pullman Standard Car Manufacturing company, where a CIO union and two AFL groups are involved in a dispute over collective bargaining.

CIO steel workers at Worcester, Mass., voted last night to return to work at the Leland-Gifford company, producers of aircraft crankshafts, ending a walkout which began August 11.

An AFL local voted at Buffalo last night to strike against the American Shipbuilding company, which has definite contracts, to enforce a demand for a closed shop. Joseph R. Jackson, union secretary, said locals in Cleveland, Lorain, Ohio, Superior, Wis., and Chicago were considering similar action. Officials of the company, which employs 3,500, made no statement.

The company is building anti-submarine net tenders for the navy and two giant ore freighters for the U. S. Steel corporation's steamship subsidiary.

Killer of W. D. McNary Sentenced to Prison

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., Aug. 22.—(AP)—John M. Holmes, 38, socialist and former army aviator, was sentenced to one to ten years imprisonment today for killing Wilson Davis McNary, Jr., distant cousin of Senator McNary of Oregon.

S. E. Hoffman, defense attorney, was cut short in a plea for probation by Superior Judge McNutt, who said, "you know perfectly well the penal code absolutely prohibits probation when a gun is used."

Holmes, who blinded himself with a bullet wound after shooting McNary, showed no emotion when sentence was passed. A jury convicted him of manslaughter.
