American Movies Hit By Japanese Restrictions

TOKYO, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The home ministry announced today that all American movies and all Japanese stage productions must obtain police permission for showing after September 1.

Police already have prohibited showings of Deanna Durbin's picture, "First Love" and the western, "Destry Rides Again."

The National City bank of New York announced today it would close branches at Kobe and Yokohama at the end of September because freezing orders had reduced business.

Since the Okasa branch was closed some months ago, the bank will have only one office in the Japanese empire.
