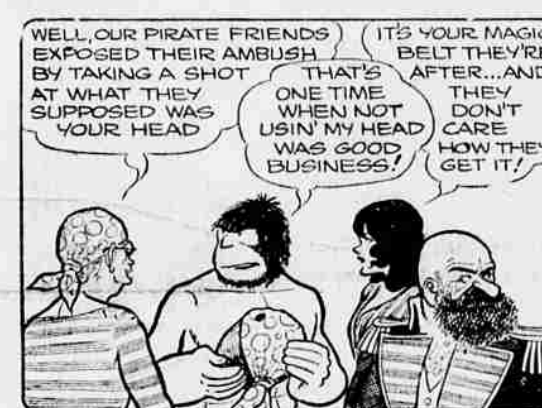
Marilyn Baker went to Sutherland the first of the week to stay with Mrs. Alice Clark for a while.

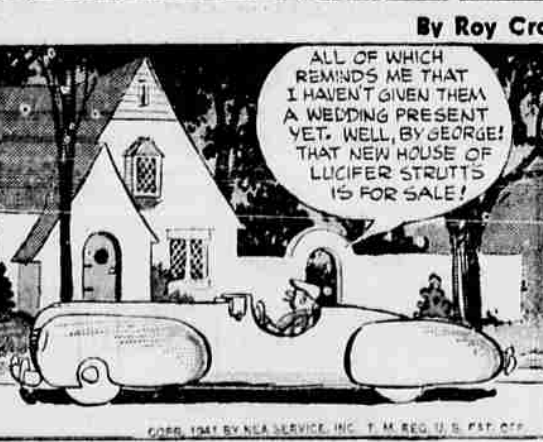
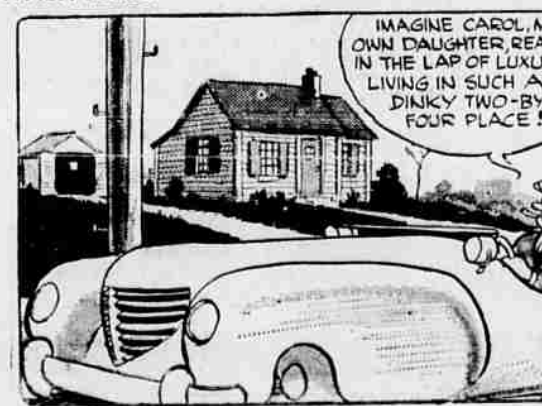
