VFW Head Urges 5th Column Swat

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Louis Nichols, assistant director of the federal bureau of investigation, called upon the Veterans of Foreign Wars yesterday for assistance in stamping out the fifth column in America.

Speaking at the veterans' national convention he advised, however, against individual detective methods because the "well-intended citizens who take it upon themselves to investigate suspicious activities" are not helping but hindering the authorities.

He said citizens should advise the F. B. I. of matters deserving investigation. "From the very beginning of the emergency," he said, "we have proceeded on the theory that it is better to prevent sabotage than to later apprehend the saboteurs. Naturally this is far less spectacular but much more beneficial to the country."

He said fifth columnists organize on two fronts, one by spending money, time and energy on propaganda; the other, by collecting military and industrial information.

Camps Designated For Elk Hunters

Announcement was made today by the Douglas Forest Protective association of established camps for Elk hunters in Douglas county. Permits must be obtained by hunters to enter the area and no camping will be permitted outside the designated camps. Each camping spot, it is reported, will be clearly marked.

The camps are as follows: Forks of the trail on Little Camp creek, Old Blue lookout, Camp Rader, end of the Old Blue road, Chandler cabin, Bear Wallows, Alder Flats and Baughman lookout.

A total closure will be in effect south of the Callahan-Tioga road in an area bounded on the east by the Reston rim road, south to the Coos Bay Wagon road and west to the township line between ranges 10 and 11, thence north back to the Callahan-Tioga road. No entry under any circumstances will be permitted in this area, it is announced.

Wair Appointed Head of Eastern Oregon Hospital

SALEM, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Dr. Donald Wair, who has been acting superintendent of the Eastern Oregon State hospital for several months, was appointed superintendent yesterday by the state board of control. He succeeds Dr. W. D. McNary.

The board tentatively approved a preliminary sketch for the proposed \$325,000 treatment hospital to be erected at the state hospital here. The building would house 120 patients.
